

EDITORIAL from the Ski School Director:

Some thoughts have occurred to me that I thought were of note concerning the past three years that I have been teaching at Holimont. Holimont has a tremendous number of skiers with many years of experience, and obviously, there are very few beginners in our midst.

Sometimes I think that people that have skied for many year take for granted their ability - good, bad of indecent. Just because you can get down the hill without falling, and just because you have skied for 10 or 20 years, doesn't mean you cannot improve. The old expression of not being able to teach an old "dog or cat" new tricks simply does not apply to skiing.

As most of you know, we have had a very enthusiastic and successful Sunday morning class for the many middle aged gentlemen who grace our slopes. Most of these fellows have skied, and I think, by and large, assumed they were at the end of the line as far as their improvement on the slopes was concerned. This is simply not the case. While it is true that someone with ingrained habits of 10 or 20 years would not learn as fast as a 14 year old beginner, nor progress as quickly as a 4 year old skier, significant improvements can be realized. It takes a longer period of time to change old habits, and certainly the muscles of a 45 year old are more difficult to train than those of a 5 year old.

A case in point (with which yours truly has been privileged to be associated) are some of the fellows in the Sunday morning class. Anyone who has known Chuck Twichell for a number of years, then saw him skiing this past winter, would not recognize the same person. Take for example, Dick Turner. Dick has been patient in learning, and last year, after having skied many years, improved 100%. Even and "old dog" like Dick Walters, I think, would freely admit that his consistent lesson approach on Sunday morning has been extremely beneficial and has changed his whole outlook on skiing.

The question comes up - why do we think it is necessary to be a better skier. Generally speaking, better skiers look better, ski longer, ski more safely, and ski a wider variety of conditions, and look "pretier to boot." Some of us are really not taking advantage of the equipment we are using. Some of us are "driving" a race car with old fashioned techiniques.

The purpose of this little dissertation is to let all those who are interested know that we in the Ski School are patient, and are capable of teaching some of the "old dogs and cats" things they never dreamed they could do. However, you have to be patient with yourself and with us, because it does take a longer period of time and cannot be done in a one or two session cram course. YES, WE WILL HAVE THE MEN'S CLASS ON SUNDAY MORNING AT 9:15 AS USUAL. I HAVE ENJOYED THIS GROUP SO MUCH I THINK SOMETIMES I SHOULD PAY THEM FOR GIVING ME THE PRIVILEGE OF CONTRIBUTING TO THEIR SUCCESS ON THE SLOPES. Some of you may be surprised at what you could accomplish, if you are patient, take the time and interest to do so.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Membership Committee

After the intense discussion on the subject of Junior Membership at the last Annual Membership Meeting, The Board of Directors received a great deal of input on the matter from a large number of Junior and Active members alike. Several open meetings were held specifically to provide the members the opportunity to give direction and to discuss the subject openly. A Study Committee was appointed by your President. For a good part of the past year is studied the Holimont Junior Membership Program, its objectives, costs, privileges, how it got started, where it's going, its limitations, and how the program can be up dated and improved.

The Junior Membership Program was on the agenda of many of the Directors' meetings. Finally, after considering all of the input, the Committee made it's recommendations, and the Directors made the following resolutions: (The Club By Laws provide for flexibility from year to year)

Junior Members will be assessed for Capital expenditures and for Operating expenditures as paid by Active Members. Such assessments would be incorporated into a formula to develop the annual cost of Junior Membership. The Initiation Fee for Junior Members who join after July 1, 1980 will be \$2,500.00. The breakdown of annual cost to Junior Members effective July 1, 1980 is as follows:

As in the past, any remaining unpaid Initiation Fee at the time the Junior Member ascends to Active Membership Status will be charged. These annual costs apply after July 1, 1980.

The Board of Directors is still studying several items including the top age limit for Junior Members, two Junior Members marrying each other, (it has already happened).

The Board of Directors has also reinforced its stand regarding the abuse of membership pass privileges and the penalties for late payment and non payment of dues by Junior Members. Junior Members will receive the same treatment as active members.

The By Laws amendment which was tabeled at the last annual Members' Meeting will be again presented for membership approval.

Just as on every other matter of Club business, your Directors have appreciated all of the input from members and have spent many long hours trying to produce a membership arrangement which is fair and workable.

These volunteer members do not act as police officers or marshalls, but are there to encourage Holimont skiers to be knowledgeable and responsible for making our club a fun and safe place to ski.

If there are any of you who would like to offer your services, I would appreciate hearing from you at my home address (58 Howard Ave. Oakville, Ontario L6J3Y5). Looking forward to seeing you all in the new season. Please support my committee and your club by giving what help you can.

REMEMBER...OCTOBERFEST, OCTOBER 11, immediately following the Annual Member's Meeting.

Holimont Incorporated is a private club with proposed facilities for swimming, skating and skiing. It is situated on 250 acres of land on the edge of Ellicottville, New York on Route 242. It was begun in 1962 by Wilber Merk, a former member and director of the Ellicottville Ski Club. Its purpose is to provide first class family skiing on slopes and trails designed to give satisfaction to all classes of skier - without the crowding and lift lines that are the curse of the public ski areas. Membership will necessarily be limited to accomplish this.

The facilities were designed and laid out by Otto Schniebs, who is probably the foremost and most experienced designer of ski developments in the country. It is situated in the southern snow belt which gets regularly in excess of 185 inches of snow eadh year.

Holimont began operation in the winter of 63 - 64 with a Hall double chair lift, and the latest snow conditioning equipment, including a brand new Tucker Sno-Cat. Full scale operation will begin in late 64 when a Hall T-Bar will also be in operation. The total uphill capacity will then be 2350 skiers per hour.

The lifts are approximately a half mile in length with a vertical rise of 550 feet to an elevation of 2,350 feet. There are eight slopes and trails, all graded, groomed, seeded and drained for maximum safety and utility. Two cross connecting trails provide for transitional skiing. The longest trail is one mile and an eighth.

Membership is by invitation only, with a membership fee of \$ 1,000. It is therefore a membership copporation (no member has more than one vote), operated by a Board of Directors elected by the membership. Our membership which is now approaching 150 includes families from Ohio, Penesylvania, Ontario Canada as well as New York.

Members and immediate family pay no lift fees. It is expected that guest fees will substantially cover operating costs so that annual dues will be nominal, probably not much more than a family would spend on a weekend at a public area.

for those members who are interested there will be 250 ski-chalet sites available on the development, adjacent to the slopes. A portion of this phase of Holimont is already developed, with roads and utilities available. At the present time seven chalets are in various stages of completeion.

If you are tired of fighting lift lines. If you are tired of skiing poorly maintained, over-skied and cromded slopes. If you are tired of paying exorbitant prices to ski...If you are tired of skiing with strangers....and miss the fellowship and 'gemuetlichkeit' that was skiing...If you enjoy congenial, friendly people and good singing You should be interested in Holimont!

FROM THE EDITORS' DESK

From the Accountant and the finance committee comes an apology.....Your Dues for this coming season are payable by October 1 and not by Sept. 1 as earlier reported. Any members remaining not paid after October 1 will be subject to late charges just as before. Members remaining unpaid 30 days after October 1 will be subject to expulsion in accordance with the ammended By-Laws. The Board of Directors feels that with the dues statements being mailed in early July each year, approximately 90 days is plenty of time to prepare for your Ski Club Obligations. The Holimont Board of Directors is prepared to adopt a "Get Tough" policy in cooperation with Police and Sheriff's Departments in dealing with persons (whether Holimont member or not) who insist on defacing and trespassing on private property on motorcycles or trail bikes. Scotty Lavtar and his Summer Crew have worked miracles getting our slopes in beautiful shape for skiing. We sometimes take it too much for granted when we can enjoy such good skiing even with very little snow. Please inform any Board Member of ane name of anyone seen on Holimont Ski Slopes on a motorcycle or Trail Bike. Holimont property is private property and strict measures will be taken in any such instance involving anyone, whether a Club Member, a member of his family, a guest, or even a local resident.

Each and every member is urged to attend the annual members' meeting on Saturday, October 11 at 2:00 PM in the Main Chalet. You will hear Committee reports covering all aspects of our Ski Club, Minutes and financial reports will be read and approved, and lively discussions are generally held. By-Laws amendments involving Junior Membership Status will be presented for approval. Your Volunteer Board of Directors needs and appreciates input, so please plan to attend. If you can't attend, please sign your proxy and send it to any Board Member in order to help guarantee a quorum so we may transact business in accordance with the By-Laws.

The Beautiful colors are beginning to re-appear on the hillsides and we're beginning to wake up to 40° temperature readings in the Ellicottville area. By Fall Festival week end conditions should be ideal to get together again and renew friendships, enjoy the Fall Festival, attend the members' meeting, and just get this whole thing going again....

As the ski season approaches, many of us are already getting into condition and thinking of new equipment. The Editors have asked Penny and Phil Kirk if they would contribute articles on these subjects, for the benefit of Holimont members.

CONDITIONING: Penny Northrup Kirk

When I was asked to write this article on conditioning, I started recalling all the many different programs I personally was involved with. What I came up with is a realization that the most beneficial program is one that strongly emphasizes not only strength building but even more important, flexibility. During my career as a competitive ski racer I was very aware that my performance was always much better when I was my most limber. Skiing itself will build and tone muscles but it keeps them in a very contracted state, therefore it is extremely important to keep your muscles flexing over the complete range of motion. I also feel that in the fall hwne everyone heads out to "get in shape for skiing" they would be well advised to start each program with at least 20 minutes of stretching and end with the same. This will greatly reduce the chance of injury and also keep the balance between muscle development and flexibility. I highly recommend buying a book on yoga stretching and following a basic program. Make sure that you stretch all parts of your body and not just the typical "toe touch". The reason for recommending a yoga type routine is that there is an emphasis on controlled breathing and concentration during each position. This so often is overlooked with young competitors, as well as most adults. Skiing by nature is rythmical. Every move one makes is the beginning of the one after, the line between the end of one turn and the start of the next, particularly in competition is barely discernable if at all. If in a conditioning program on becomes aware of the rythm of breathing and moving it will develop ones awareness of what happens when they start down the hill.

EQUIPMENT: Phil Kirk

The sport of ski racing requires concentration, balance, agility, strength, flexibility, and endurance. Any equipment which hampers any of these functions will result in less than optimal performance, and will increase the risk of injury. Keeping this in mind here are some helpful hints when you and your young ski racer choose their equipment.

Boots- If I were to rate equipment in order of importance, first and foremost would be ski boots. Without proper fit, flex, and cant, optimal performance will certainly be restricted. It has been my experience that young racers, especially in the III's & IV's class tend to choose boots that are too stiff and too high. A young racer generally does not need a world cup level racing boot. Remember that these boots are designed for the musculo-skeletal structure of the adult and the strength of a finely conditioned world class athlete. They may be too stiff to flex properly and too high for the leg of the growing young racer. Ask the advice of a qualified sales person at a reputable ski shop when choosing boots, and keep the following things in mind:

Makes sure that the boots fit snugly around the entire foot, that there are no pressure points, and that there is room for toe movement. (Try on both boots).

Make sure that the young racer is able to flex the ankle and knee properly and that there are no pressure points when in the flexed and edged position.

Make Sure that the boots do not put the racer in an exacgerated position. (causing undue muscle tension and fatigue).

Make sure that when the racer is standing in what he believes is a balanced, neutral position that the soles of both boots are flat on the floor and that the knees are centered and in line with the feet.

Choosing boots is a time consuming process, but it is well worth the time spent. (Next Leaf, Skiis.)

HOLIMONT RACING NEWS - Burt Kellock

We welcome a new, but familiar director of the racing program, a former director of the Holimont Ski School, Bill McCaughey. A separate note from Bill together with the application forms for the Christmas Camp and the Season Program is included in this envelope. Like everything else I can think of, the cost of skiing has gone up. However, we believe that the 1980-81 fee schedule is not only reasonable (break it down per hour, per day or even per weekend and you will see) it is much lower than the cost of comparable programs elsewhere. The reason for this is simply the fact that the time required to organize and operate our racing program is given freely by our members. While coaches receive honorariums, such are not regarded as other than tokens of our appreciation. This means, this year, as in the past, that we depend upon the parents of racers to insure the success of the program.

CHOOSING SKIIS - Phil Kirk

Choosing skiis for the junior racer can become an almost insurmountable task if we allow ourselves to get caught up in the quagmire of technical terminology, designs and product claims. Questions like, should I buy a slalom ski or a giant slalom ski? Does the young racer need a different pair of skiis for each event? What about torsion, side cut, side deflection, longitudinal flex, camber, profile, etc? If these things have boggled your mind, here are some helpful suggestions.

The most important thing for young racers to learn in the early stages of ski racing is solid technique, specifically how to carve turns of different radius' at different speeds on different snow conditions and terrain. One pair of good giant slalom type skiis of fairly even flex (possibly a bit softer in the tip) should be sufficient. Be sure that the skiis are not too stiff for the weight and ability of your young racer. Ski technology has advanced to the point where it is no longer necessary that racing skiis be extremely stiff in order to hold in demanding situations. In fact you would be surprised at how soft some of the world cup skiers like their skiis. Stay away from radical side cuts, and radical designs. They will not be helpful at this stage of racing. Check to see that the skiis you pick out have the same serial number and do in fact match. Also, do not be swayed by cosmetics. Stick to the basics of performance and function at a reasonable price.

All of the major ski manufacturers have excellent skiis available for the junior ski racer. When you go out to purchase your racer a pair of skiis follow these guidelines and engage the assistance of qualified ski shop personnel. (As a general rule you will get the best assistance at reputable ski specialty shops as opposed to mass merchandisers.)

One final note - make sure that the skiis you purchase are flat filed so that the bottoms are absolutely flat, not concave or convex, that the edges are absolutely square, and that the bottoms are impregnated with wax before use.

PEE WEE PEP TAIK - Barbie and Mike Staniforth

Now is the time to make sure that skis, boots, bindings and bodies are ready for the coming season - especially bodies! Any sport that combines strength and agility is good. Jogging is also good, and running down ski hills is great! If you are in good shape you will be faster in races.

This years Pee Wee Program will offer: How to prepare your skis properly - base, edges, and waxing. More dual slalom head to head racing. More timed runs in gates. Learn how to start, ski and finish efficiently to improve your times. More meets with other clubs if possible.

OPERATIONS: Ed Anderson

With the chill winds blowing, snow can't be too far off, and with the snow comes another season of great Holi-skiing.

Your membership lift badges will be arriving soon, possibly even before you receive this copy of the Holileaf. As a reminder we would like to repeat a few rules that apply to the usage of the badges.

1. A current picture of yourself should be permanently attached to the badge. The picture should show a clear view of your face but should not be so large as to cover up your name or badge number.

2. Show your badge at all times when using lift facilities. Our lift facilities, especially the Plum Creek, Meadow, and the "J" bar, are readily accessible to the public and we wish to make sure that only authorized persons are utilizing our club facilities.

If you were present at the Annual Meeting, the following is a review; if not these facts are new: 61 accidents and injuries for last season - our best record to date. We can do better! Accident ratio: guest 65%, member 35%; 55% of the injuires and accidents were after lunch!

I briefly commented on the importance of the pre-ski exercises which are even more important with every passing birthday and they can pay dividends. That little extra stretch, or short walk up the hill on skiis, or that dance called the twist; in other words, stretch the muscles and the tendons and warm-up the tissues before getting in your car to go to the hill or getting on the lift in the morning. A little time spent in exercising before you ski could save endless hours of grief and disappointment when something happens to you that should not have happened.





CHRISTMAS AT HOLIMONT - John McHugh



The first Christmas at Holimont was a very dark affair...not a single light on the hill. A few years later, when chalets were built, Christmas lights blossomed on the chalets of Mellinger, Vaughan, Buell, Hazard, Mirehouse, Gallagher, Wright and Fuller, Hilger, and Richards to name some of the early ones, and the spectacle became a local sensation. Literally people from around the County drove over to see the Christmas lights at Holimont. Members driving in from Rochester, Cleveland, Buffalo and Canada experienced a great lift when they saw the beautiful sights. If your chalet is not lighted, why not add to the splendor this year?

The Christmas Holileaf of 1964, announced three Holimont presents. The first was the completion of the T-Bar, a big lift; four female and two male Pullman flush toilets had been installed (how do you tell the difference between a female and male Pullman toilet?); but the biggest present of all was the announcement that Scotty Lavtar had been appointed Director of the Ski School.


