


REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP: TED TARBELL

STUFFED CAMEL

1 whole medium sized camel, 1 whole large lamb, 20 medium chickens, 60 eggs, 12 lb. rice, 2 lb. pine nuts, 2 lb. almonds and 1 lb. pistachio nuts, 110 ga. water, black pepper & salt to taste.

Skin, clean & trim the camel, lamb & the chickens & boil until tender. Cook rice until fluffy: fry the nuts until brown and mix with the rice. Hard boil the eggs & peel. Stuff the chickens with eggs and rice: stuff the lamb with 5 of the chickens & rice. Stuff the camel with the lamb & more rice. Broil in a large oven or near a gas flare until brown. Spread the remaining rice on a very large tray & place the camel on top. Place the rest of the chickens around the camel. Decorate with rice, boiled eggs & nuts.



REPORT OF THE SUNRISE EAST COMMITTEE

A Sunrise East Committee meeting was held Wednesday, December 30th. Considerable time was spent discussing our snow making system in the light of poor snow conditions over the Christmas/New Years Holidays. Our snow making system was not meant to cover the whole area or even a given hill from top to bottom without some natural snow. We selected the so called "airless" type of snow making to supplement natural snow and provide spot coverage for those steep places where natural snow is scrapped off and a new base is required.

Older members might remember that when we started with snow making in the 73/74 season, we purchased snall gasoline powered snow guns which were really not effective when compared with our present four electrical snow cannons

When the decision was made to start building a snow making system the conventional compressed air and water method of making snow was not economically pratical for Holimont. Both the first cost and the electrical and maintenance cost of a compressor system were simply too great.

The main limitation of "airless" snow making is that above 27°F we cannot make snow in any quantity. A compressed air system is more effective at mild temperatures. With real cold weather, below 15°F, however, the "airless" cannons will produce much more snow than compressor systems.

Our pumping and piping system will provide plenty of water but our electrical power circuit will only allow three of our four guns to be placed on a given hill at the same time. The committee placed a study of the problem and possible corrective measures high on the priority list.

Jean Swanson has kept a diary of Holimont for the past 13 years. In summary the Christmas/New Years skiing conditions are listed as follows:

With regard to future area development, the committee concluded there was no pressing desire to expand any further to the east at this time, but that it was desireable to erect a lift to serve our new Sunrise area to provide better access and relieve some of the crowding on the present Plum Creek lift.

The subject will be studied by the committee and your board of directors during the winter and a report will be presented to the membership at the end of the season.

At this time we the coachs would like to thank the Holimont members, the Board of Directors and Scotty and his snow making crew for making an area available to us, during these difficult snowless days of January.



REPORT FROM THE SUNRISE EAST COMMITTEE

Jack Swanson, Chairman

The committee appointed by President Tarbell was made up of some directors and members who have been active in club affairs over the years. The committee members are:

More recently, Paul Philp attended the last committee meeting and Bob Schroeder has offered his services if any construction proceeds.

The committee held several meetings during the winter and many sub meetings were held to review on-site problems and proposals.

Briefly, the task before the committee was to determine if-when-and-how to develop the HoliMont property to the east now that the top of the mountain has been acquired by the club.

Some members might question why any development plans are being considered when we have had such a poor season with a large operating loss. The answer is that HoliMont's success has been built on keeping operating funds generated by dues, operating assessments and guest fees separate from capital funds which come from new members depreciation and capital assessments. If capital funds were spent to operate the club, we would still be skiing on Exhibition and the Tee Bar.

The report of Ginny Walters shows that in spite of adding 15 new members last season, the total number of members passes is still less than 2,000 and in fact, actually declined last year due to some children moving away to the adult world. In addition, some of the "senior" members are skiing less, which probably will allow for a few more new members to be admitted this fall. This will, in turn, extend the input of new capital funds over the next few years.

SUNRISE REPORT: CONT'D

The first stumbling block to any new development in Sunrise East is the fact that the base and much of the hill lies within the Ellicottville Village limits.

The zoning ordinance designated the base as R-2 residential and the hill as A-1 agricultural. Your committee met with the Town Fathers several times and finally received approval to build a new lift to the top of Cascade if the Board of Directors decides to implement part or all of the committee recommendations.

The final committee meeting was held Saturday, March 19 at 3 p.m. It was a cold, damp, rainy day. Hardly one to give thoughts of skiing in our new area. Paul Philp joined with the committee members present who were in 100% agreement to present a program to the Board of Directors at their meeting Friday, April 15th.

All committee members have been requested to solicit views from the membership. Therefore, the committee report should express the views of a broad cross-section of those members who have been at HoliMont on a regular basis.

Actually, once cold weather arrived, we were able to make enough snow to have good but not super skiing. The '82-'83 ski season was so unusual that we do not expect another as mild next year. We must, however, make plans to maximize the skiing in our present area even in mild winters, therefore an increased snow making capability is an integral part of the committee recommendations.

On the other hand, Cascade from top to bottom represents the best skiing potential between Lake Placid and Colorado. The better skiiers in the club have been waiting for years to enjoy this area.

The Board of Directors will receive and possibly act on the report April 15th.





MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER: JACK SWANSON

As BUTCH CANNON describes it- this has been an "non-winter". With every surge of cold weather SCOTTY made as much snow as our equipment would allow but as we all know, we do not have the capability of covering Holimont with man-made snow from Sunrise to #8.

In spite of the weather Holimont has had surprisingly good skiing from the last half of January through the end of February. Our guest income however has suffered because skiiers in Buffalo, Ohio, Rochester or Ontario cannot imagine that there was any skiing when they had green grass in their yard.

Our budget for the 82-83 season included \$248,500 guest income and total expenses of \$417,500. As of February 22nd our guest income was only \$103,000 with an expectation of \$140,000 for the year. This will be the lowest guest income since the 79-80 season. Obviously we must minimize our expenses in order to avoid a drain on our reserves for capital projects.

Our March guest income in recent years has ranged from a low of \$27,000 to a high of \$47,000. We have very little base this year so a warm spell could terminate our skiing at the earliest date in Holimont's nineteen year history.

This all indicates that we will have an operating assessment this year which will be slightly more than last year. The actual amount depends on the weather and guest income during March.

ATTENTION CANADIAN MEMBERS

Canadians owning condominiums or any other real property in the U.S. will be required to file new information returns with the U.S. suthorities under the Foreign Investment in Real Property Act of 1980, and heavy penalties could result from failure to meet the filing deadlines.

Reporting requirements are imposed on all foreign persons or entities with U.S. real property interests, which are defined to include practically all conceivable forms of interest in real property including condominiums, rental real estate, leases, and oil and gas interests. There are three general reporting categories, one of which is a foreign person owning an interest in U.S. real property with a market value of more than \$50,000.

CANADIAN MEMBERS: cont'd

Generally, information returns for the 1982 calendar year must be filed by May 15, 1983, and returns respecting 1980 and 1981 will have to be filed by June 21, 1983. We understand that the information returns will not be available until March of this year.

Penalties for each infraction will be \$25 U.S. per day while the requirements are not met, up to a maximum of \$25,000 U.S. Criminal penalties can apply for willful failure to file.

Members affected can get copies of the information returns directly from the Internal Revenue Service offices in the U.S. or a U.S. Consulate office in Canada.

When you take the T-Bar, you have probably noticed the sign "STAY IN TRACK". This is not only to keep the groove defined for ease of riding the lift, there is an important safety reason for these instructions. The T-Bar cable rests on a U-shaped roller. Moving the 'T' too far to the left or right can actually "jump" the calbe off the roller, causing the cable to collapse. This could, and has in other areas, caused severe injuries to anyone riding the 'T' at the same time. The same result can occur when you off-load half way up.

PROGRESS REPORT ON SUNRISE EAST: TED TARBELL, PRESIDENT

Several years ago when the Leyens property became available the Club was able to purchase the area we call Sunrise East. Many of us had been anticipating this acquisition for years. It was the last major land acquisition necessary to complete the long range plans for development of Holimont as envisioned fifteen or twenty years ago.

This year the Board decided to make this whole area available for skiing by installing a new lift and snowmaking. The base of the double chair will be located just east (toward the Village) of the Plum Creek chair proceeding up Cascade and terminating at the top of Sunrise. The chair is on order from Borvig and is similar to the one they supplied for the Meadow. Installation is scheduled for fall and the chair will be ready when the first snow arrives.

Much of the grading has already been completed. The lower section of Cascade has been made wider and of more uniform pitch so that it will be easier for the novice skier. Over 100 feet of culvert is being installed in the creek to widen the runout to both lifts. New lines will be installed to provide water and power for snowmaking on Cascade, Wild Turkey and the top of Sunrise.

Four Fan-Jet snowmakers are on order and will be delivered in the fall. These machines are smaller than our present Hedco machines. One of the Fan-Jets was demonstrated at Holimont last winter and our snowmaking experts liked what they saw. The Fan-Jets make snow at slightly higher temperatures and their cost is about one-third that of the Hedcos. (At low temperatures the present machines will, of course, produce much greater quantities of snow.)

Next winter should be a great one with the new area completed. I hope you will all enjoy it.

Have a hot sunny summer. Looking forward to seeing everyone at the annual meeting and Octoberfest October 8.

POUNDING ON THE HILL RETURNS !!

Report from the Treasurer

Our fiscal year closed June 30th and your directors have asked me to present preliminary information on the financial status of the club in light of last year's poor ski season.

Our operating loss for the year is projected to be \$60,000 to \$65,000 which includes depreciation of \$79,000. In other words, we will do better than break even on cash flow and will earn a portion of our depreciation. The guest fees for the 82/83 season were \$139,202 less than the previous year. It is evident that the club management worked hard to keep expenses at a minimum consistent with our reduced income.

The total dues and assessments for the 83/84 season of \$500 for an active family membership was based on the fact that we had an operating loss for the 82/83 season, but guest income must increase or we are likely to sustain another operating loss next season.

HoliMont will finish the year with a cash balance of \$150,000 after adding back some payments for next seasons projects which were made before June 30th. As most members know, we have tried very hard to avoid spending capital or membership funds on normal club operations. This policy has allowed HoliMont to be developed to its present state without any existing debt. A continuing flow of membership funds plus earned depreciation has allowed HoliMont to have our present cash position of \$150,000.

The budget for the Sunrise East Development was based on a cash position of \$140,000 at June 30th plus delayed membership fees due Oct. 1, 1983 of \$71,500 and other funds such as the sale of real estate and some new members. At this date, the available funds and the expenditures are very much on target.

The new projects for next season include:

Clearing Cascade top to bottom
Culver Plum Creek and open up bottom of Cascade

New double chair lift up Cascade (just a super trail--best yet)

1,500' snow making piping and power on Cascade

4 new snow making machines

Additional power on Exhibition to allow operation of more snow making machines

Season pass machine

Additional hand held radios to cover the area

We encourage all members to check out the work in progress. The lift will not be completed until later this fall because we waited to receive membership input and we wanted to delay the expenditure of funds until as late in the season as possible.

All of this activity has been planned to help commemorate and celibrate HoliMont's 20th year. It was on February 22, 1964 that the Exhibition lift was first put into service. We have grown a lot in 20 years and here's hoping that next season will be the best yet.

Treasurer's Report

The report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1983, has been completed and is being printed for distribution at the annual meeting. A condensed profit and loss and balance sheet are included in this issue of The HoliLeaf. If any member wishes a copy of the full financial report prior to the annual meeting, please contact Dom Lorigo at 1605 Kenmore Avenue (716) 874-6266.

The loss for the year was \$49,098 which included depreciation of \$79,026. These results are better than our revised income and expense projections during the year. The poor skiing season of course resulted in drastically reduced guest income. With greater snow making capability we look for an increased level of skiing activity and guest income for the coming season.

As this report is being written, dues which must be postmarked before September 1st have not been received from 30% of our members. After this date a \$20 late payment penalty will be assessed. On October 1st, an additional \$10 late payment penalty will be added, and after November 1st, termination letters will be mailed. The reason for this date is to identify any members who might be thinking of resigning, so that they may be replaced if necessary at the beginning of the season by new members who are on our waiting list.

At the last meeting, your Board of Directors voted to extend invitations to 15 new members to join HoliMont. The membership fee was placed at \$5,000 an increase of \$500 over last year. A 4-year payment schedule of \$1,500, \$1,500, \$1,500, and \$1,400 was selected which would equate to 12% interest on the unpaid balance. The Junior Membership fee was not increased.

A lengthly discussion was held regarding the increase in membership fee. The Board is concerned that many good, prospective members would not be able to afford this membership fee even though the actual value is much greater. Over the years existing members have paid \$50 and \$100 capital assessments and they worked very hard to build up our revenue and minimize our expenses to allow HoliMont to be the complete ski area that it is today. When compared with the investment of time and money of existing members, HoliMont is well worth \$5,000. On the other hand, we certainly do not want to exclude members who would find that amount of money to be an obstacle. If any members wish to express opinions on this subject at the annual meeting, they will be well received.

Real Estate

Your Directors have concluded an agreement in principle to sell some land on both sides of the exit road at the lower level for the construction of condominiums. As you know, your club is not in the business of housing development, but wherever possible, we try to make land available so that members can arrange for housing near the center of club activities. HoliMont becomes stronger as more members develop housing in the vicinity of the club. It is planned that some of these units will be available for occupancy this skiing season.

Sunrise Lift Development

As many of you have seen, Cascade has been cleared to the bottom with a large exit bowl to eliminate the traffic bottleneck that previously existed to the east of the Plum Creek Lift. The hill has been seeded and grass is starting to grow. The snowmaking piping has been delivered and is being welded prior to installation and some parts of the new chair have been delivered to the jobsite.

Concrete foundations for the terminals and towers should be started this week and we hope to show significant progress at the annual meeting. With the construction of the new lift coinciding with our 20th Anniversary celebration, all we will need is plenty of snow to have the best skiing winter yet.

And yet another season is upon us. According to the almanacs, Indians and all the 'know', this should prove to be a Big One!
But, big or not-so-big, or safety rules and regulations still apply; and although we're all familiar with them (aren't we?) a review is a must - keeping in mind the "skier responsibility New York State Code 54" - the law of the land (snow) so to speak!

(1) The Overtaking skier should always give way. (Uphill skiers stay safely clear of skiers lower on the hill)

(2) Do not jump at intersections or in any areas in which a collision with

another skier could take place.

(3) Skier proceeding downhill has the right of way over a skier entering that hill from a side trail. NOTE: When entering an intersecting trail, skiers should slow down and look up.

(4) Do not ski so fast that you are unable to stop quickly enough to avoid

collisions.

(5) A skier who has stopped on the hill, before proceeding, must give right of way to anyone already skiing on the hill.

(6) Skiers must stay in tracks when using T-bar.

(7) Members' lift passes or daily guest ticket must be clearly visible when skiing, or you will not be allowed on T-bar or chair lifts. Wearing another member's lift pass may result in expulsion.

Regarding our guests - We must continue to "aware them" of our rules, direct them when necessary and always keep them welcome and safe.

TUCKING and therefore BASHING HILLS is considered unsafe skiing and must be discouraged - so the Board is unanamous that passes could be lifted at the discretion of the Hill Control Executive Committee.

Cross Country Skiing At HoliMont:

The use of Cross Country Skis on our downhill slopes is of increasing interest and practice. Since you or your guests may wish to use our downhill facitlties using cross country skis, your Board of Directors thought that it would be wise to develop a set of Rules directed toward the safe practice of this sport.

A large number of U.S. ski resorts have been surveyed over the past few months to learn of their experience and to determine what rules and regulations they are using to govern the practice of cross country skiing on dwwnhill slope:

The following rules, therefore, which are consistent with the practices in other areas, will apply to the use of Cross Country Skis at HoliMont:

1. Use of Cross Country Skis on the Holimont downhill slopes is permitted.

2. All safety rules currently applying to skiing on the Holimont slopes will be applicable when using cross country equipment. This includes the use of approved brakes or safety retention devices (strings or cords are not included as safety devices).

3. Guests will be required to purchase a Guest Lift Pass for utilization of lifts and slopes. A free one-time-per-day Pass can be secured at the Office for those who wish to use the Lifts to reach Cross Country Trail

at the top of our property.

Since the use of Cross Country Skis on our slopes is new and growing, we would appreciate hearing any comments that you may have, all of which will be seriously considered. Please direct any thoughts that you do have to me, Mike McCulloch, or any other Director.

Now is the time for those conditioning exercises so let's get at them and make this season more safe and 'funer' for all of <u>us</u> and our <u>guests</u>.



17. Decorations - use hooks and wires provided - no tacks, nails or tape on the new woodwork.


