Katie, who is four months pregnant, had been employed as a lift attendant at HoliMont. Rick works for Jack Kramer, HoliMont Ski School Director, in the construction of railroad tie walls, stairs, etc. (in the summer) and in snow removal during the winter.

If you or a group of your friends are interested, please inquire at the Ski School desk. Times can be arranged on any Saturday and Sunday (during the week too!).



REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP: TED TARBELL



SWEEP - SKI PATROL


"Sweep" what is it? A little sort of man with black brushes that cleans your chimney? That's a chimney sweep, but for us skiers a sweep is a ski patrol duty. Many people wonder why, at precisely 4:20 p.m., they are not allowed to ride the lift again for that extra last run. The ski patrol is authorized by management of HoliMont to close the lifts at the end of each day and no one rides after the patrol for a very good reason.

Can you imagine the plight of an injured skier left on the hill with no one skiing by to help him? The purpose of sweep is to prevent such a disaster from happening. Sweep begins as the patrol is organized by radio at the top of each lift, so that a patroller skis down every run and trail. He is the very last person to ski down that run. As he skis down the run he checks with the other patrollers sweeping the runs on either side of him. Careful attention is paid to the tree line and woods on each side of the run or trail. The entire hill is "swept clean" by one coordinated wave of patrollers, so that not one skier is left on the hill. Each patroller also checks out at the bottom of the hill after the sweep, to make sure that no patroller has had an accident himself.

So, when you see the patrol gathered at the lift at the end of the day, please remember it's not for just one last run, but for a very important and necessary safety job!

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Advice from the National Ski Patrol System: "People who drink & ski may get plastered."



20 YEARS AGO: THE LOG CONTINUES. . .

- 3-1-64 Cold windy day - many HoliMonters had early breakfast at Duch Roys. Good skiing until early afternoon when wet snow started to fall making skiing difficult.
- 3-7-64 Some HoliMont skiers tried Mt. Snow, Vermont slopes where all had a good time but from information obtained later, HoliMont had some rain which limited skiing but did not stop all in attendance from enjoying themselves.
- 3-8-64
- 3-14-64 Raining/skiing good but weather kept many skiers away from slopes. Apres ski party held at the Sardinia Hotel.
- 3-15-64 Nice weather again and improved skiing but unable to use the run-out. Used the mid-station loading platform for the first time.
- 3-21-64 Weather not cooperating. Wet snow fell all day requiring foul weather gear. Group was sparse but still held a social following skiing.
- 3-22-64 Colder weather gave us better skiing on good conditioned slopes except for runout. However the prior poor skiing conditions had taken its course & now many skiers put their 'boards' away for the season.
- 3-28-64 Again good weather with good conditions except for runout forcing the use of the rather difficult loading at the mid-station. One skier tried to use runout and had ripped pants as a result, but didn't prevent him from attending the apres ski party !!
- 3-29-64 Easter Sunday- Cold with too little snow and poor skiing and very few skiers at HoliMont.
- 4-4-64 Beautiful sunny day with more natural snow to provide good skiing most of the day. Had a party, everyone expecting this to be our last weekend.
- 4-5-64 Another beautiful sunny day with good skiing but snow was leaving the slopes fast and it turned out to be our last day of skiing at HoliMont to end the 1963-64 season.
- 4-13-64 HoliMont's first "End of the Season Skiing Party" was held at 'Bernie's Barn' in honor of Bob Kreitner. A "This is your life Bob Kreitner" skit written, produced and directed by John McHugh was the highlight of the night. The party was held to an overflow crowd and everyone had a great time looking forward to a better and longer 64/65 season.

Holimont: Different Ski Area

It evolved from a dream in the minds of a group of ski enthusiasts back in the early 1960s. For the most part, they skied in and around Ellicottville, N.Y. — Fish Hill, Greer Hill, Holiday Valley.

But they were looking for something different.

"Something was missing," related John Sullivan by phone from his Buffalo home last week. "It was difficult raising a (ski) family in the valley."

So Sullivan and his friends looked

across the ridge and saw an area conducive to ski development opposite Holiday Valley.

"We went across the ridge and started a family ski club," Sullivan said. "One that had a limit to the number of guests, one that limited the number in (chair) lift


lines. We wanted it to be a non-profit organization, and one that had the ability to offer economic housing in the area."

In 1963, that dream became reality as Holimont Ski Club, with some 35 to 40 members, came into being.

Today, Holimont has 620 members — 195 juniors, 425 adults — making it the largest ski club in the nation, noted Swanson, past president and current club treasurer. And two weeks ago, Holimont celebrated its 20th anniversary by dedicating a fourth chair lift.

The private club, located along Route 242 two miles outside of Ellicottville, is the largest taxpaying group in Cattaraugus County.

It boasts some 250 acres, containing approximately 200 condominiums and housing units, an increasing number of which are inhabited year-round. Several other Holimont members live in nearby Ellicottville. Twenty individual trails are available.



HOLIMONT SKI AREA boasts what it feels is the largest ski club membership in the country. Some 620 members are part of the private club located in Ellicottville on the

back side of Holiday Valley. The club covers 250 acres and features 200 condominiums.



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REPORT TO THE MEMBERS: TED TARBELL

The annual meeting will be held on Saturday, October 6th at 1:30 PM. The Board of Directors encourages everyone to attend. A separate meeting-notice, proxy and return envelope will be mailed to you in the middle of September. Please sign and return the proxy, even if you plan to attend. You may revoke your proxy once you arrive at the meeting. In the past it has been a difficult, time-consuming job to reach a quorum without an adequate number of proxies and members to get the meeting started. We would like to avoid a late start this year.

The summer has been a busy one for the work crew. We are making major investments to improve skiing conditions. Three major projects are underway.

The largest project in both money (approximately \$100,000) and time is improving and expanding the snowmaking facilities. New water and electric lines are being installed on Sunrise, the bottom of Snowbird, the top of Goatpath, the top of Downspout and a couple of other areas that do not have proper coverage now. Six new snow machines are on order, bringing the total to thirteen. We estimate that with low enough temperatures and by utilizing all machines on the slope, Exhibition can be changed from green to white in 48 hours.

We have purchased a used Piston Bully from Kittington. It is only two years old and in excellent condition. Some of the grooming problems last year were a result of not enough equipment that was operational. Older cats were in the shop when they should have been grooming. This new piece of equipment will correct this problem. Both Piston Bullies will be equipped with powder makers (expanded metal rollers) which will improve the snow surface when it is hard.

The third big project involves replacing the drive on the Exhibition lift with a variable speed motor, similar to the ones on the other chairlifts. This allows the operator to slow the lift down for novice skiers and small children. We trust this will reduce the frequent stops experienced in the past caused by people falling when trying to load.

There are many smaller projects underway as well - everything from hill work to pond deepening to culverts in the creek.

The cost of all this work will exceed \$200,000, all of which will come out of existing funds. Your club has no debt at this time and does not anticipate incurring any.

I look forward to seeing you at the annual meeting, and the Fall Festival which follows.

THE NEW SNOWMAKING AND GROOMING PHILOSOPHY
AT HOLIMONT

The Hill Committee received a lot of good feedback from the members and guests about the condition of the snow on the hill last year. This triggered an extensive research project which included participating in the SMI Ski Area Owners and Managers Meeting, attending the Annual NSAA Conference and Equipment Show and Exposition, visiting some other ski areas, and making many phone calls to other areas in order to determine what the successful ski areas are doing to give their skiers the best of conditions at the optimum cost. The rest of this article will outline the philosophy that has been generated from this research and discussion and will be introduced in the '84-'85 season.

Snowmaking efforts will be concentrated on one hill at a time. The hill will be shut down and as much snowmaking machinery as can be used will be put on the hill. Skier cooperation in not skiing the hill while the hill is being covered will be greatly appreciated. We have learned that only one-third of the snow is made while the gun blows the snow in the air. The other two-thirds is crystallized on the ground during a period of setup. Once the hill has been adequately covered, it will be given the time for this snow crystallization to occur. It will then be groomed and opened for skiing.

We will be using a technique at the top of the hills called "snow farming" to store snow for the thin spots that will ultimately appear on the hill. With our present grooming equipment, it is relatively easy for us to push a little snow from the top of the hill down to cover the area of concern. This will help eliminate having to drag a snowmaker over to take care of one particular bad spot.

Moguls or bump runs will be handled somewhat differently in snowmaking than a regular slope. It is felt that a little bit dryer snow on a mogul run is advantageous. The mogul run will have enough snowmaking dedicated to it so that we can very heavily cover that hill. The equipment will then be pulled from the hill and the hill groomed. At that point, it will be opened for skiing and the development of the bumps. Periodically, a mogul run may require more snow or grooming due to icing. Should this occur, the run will be closed and appropriate action taken, the slope regroomed and then again opened for new bump development. We should note that, during the course of the season, we will never groom all of the bump runs at once so there will always be a couple of runs well moguled up for skiing.

Fall snowmaking will start with the use of the Plum Creek Pumping Station. The reason for this is that the colder water makes for more efficient snowmaking, and in the fall, the pond water is still relatively warm whereas the stream will be closer to the air temperature.

Grooming will be accomplished somewhat differently in that it will start immediately after the skiing day is over and go until completion. The

NEW MEMBERSHIP WAITING LIST

In the last issue of the HoliLeaf, the board brought to the members' attention the fact that on-going discussions had been held regarding the establishment of a new waiting list, and as a separate issue, whether some attention should be paid to the makeup of our membership. The ratio of active and Junior Members, of Canadian and U.S. members, and the age grouping of our members has been reviewed and comments were invited from the membership so they could be published and create a dialogue.

One member responded regarding the waiting list procedure which would be followed by the lottery to determine each person's position on that list. We have published elsewhere in this HoliLeaf a copy of the present by-laws pertaining to the waiting list procedure. In the past, the board has been lax in following the procedure as outlined in the by-laws, and Membership Chairman, Jack South, merely implemented what had been previously established.

The board and individual committees debated the following questions:

1. HoliMont was founded by a majority of members from the U.S. As these original members have moved away or ski less, there has been a large increase in members from nearby Canada. If this trend were to continue, would it have a desirable impact on HoliMont?
2. Is the present Junior Membership program filling the need to keep our club young? Why are fewer children of U.S. members joining as Junior Members? There is an age gap between the end of the Junior Membership program at age 33 and the average age of 45 for a prospective active member on the waiting list.
3. As our members get older, those who do not have housing in Ellicottville tend to resign from the club. It isn't economical to pay dues and assessments to ski 3 or 4 times a year. They can buy lift tickets on those special weekends and be far ahead. Is a senior membership category with lower fees desirable?

After debating the above subjects in depth for a considerable period of time, the board has voted to place some by-law changes in front of the membership at our meeting this October.

It is clear that children of members from the U.S. are less likely to remain in the northeast after they complete their schooling. Large corporations offer job opportunities all over the U. S., and unless the

children are able to move into a family business or profession, the odds are they will settle in another part of the U.S. and move perhaps 3 or 4 times during their business career.

Children from nearby Canada, however, have career opportunities in the "Golden Horseshoe" because Toronto has grown to be the financial center of Canada. This results in a greater number of Junior Members from Canada than from the U.S. This spread will compound in the future as this trend continues.

The board also became aware that the Junior Membership was really a Family Membership. Although some Juniors were single, others were married and had as many as two children. It is not economical for a single person to join, although they receive a guest ticket. A pattern had developed where single Junior Members were actually selling their guest ticket to finance the basic Junior Membership.

This is not an attractive situation, and the board will present to the membership for approval a new Junior Membership category to avoid the necessity of selling the other half of their membership.

HoliMont will be 21 years old. Many of our original members are now in their 60's. If they have housing in Ellicottville, they ski less but remain active in the club. If they don't have housing, they tend to resign because it isn't practical to remain a member and only ski once or twice a year. The board will present a by-law change in October which will allow a Senior Membership category so that members who have been active for at least 10 years, and have reached the age of 65, will only pay 1/2 dues and assessments. This is not a new concept. Holiday Valley charges 1/2 lift tickets for skiers who are 65 and for those who have reached 70 and are still willing and able, ski for free. Out west, some areas have reduced lift ticket charges starting at age 62. There is a precedent for such action. We hope that we can all be skiing at age 65.

With the retirement of some of our older members, the majority of which are from the U.S., and with an increasing percentage of Canadian Junior Members, it becomes clear that the club could swing to a majority of members from Canada. At present, the active membership is approximately equal between the U.S. and Canada. The board considers that this is a desirable ratio and therefore, a by-law change will be presented to indicate that the active membership shall be no more than 50% Canadian. This will not change the Junior Membership category, because they are automatically entitled to membership based on their parents' membership. This would apply solely to new active members.

An additional problem was discussed but not resolved regarding Junior

Membership Update:

In the last Leaf we outlined the procedure to be followed to apply for a place on the membership wait list. Please accept my apologies for several areas which were either wrong or unclear. The following will attempt to clarify these matters.

1. The official application form was not included in the HoliLeaf, but had previously been sent to you with your annual dues statement. One is included with this copy of the Leaf.

2. As a matter of clarification, the \$500 check which accompanies the application will not be cashed until after the Priority Wait List is determined in early October. If the applicant is not successful in being placed on the Priority Wait List, the check will be returned uncashed to the applicant.

3. The By-Laws require that letters of recommendation be from Active Members. This is stated in Article III, Section 3.1 (a) which reads as follows: "All applications for active membership shall be in writing accompanied by the recommendation of three Active Members acquainted with the applicant..." We are bound by the By-Laws to follow this requirement, and this means that letters of recommendation from Junior Members are not acceptable. While I am not in favor of this limitation to Active Members, we have no choice but to live with it.

To date, we have not received any letters of recommendation from Junior Members.

reason for this is that there is a setup time for freshly tilled or worked snow that takes roughly six hours. Starting at 4:30 will allow us to accomplish the grooming and give the snow the appropriate length of setup for optimum skiing in the morning. Our snow-packing efforts will rely largely on two pieces of equipment--the tiller and the powder maker. The tiller will be used on relatively warm or wet snow. That would be roughly 20° or above and the powder maker will be used on the dryer or colder snow. New snow or man-made snow will be either tilled or packed with the powder maker. The rubber-tired rollers will be used only on thin conditions or where the snowfall is so heavy that the tiller or the powder maker will plug and cannot handle it should we be that lucky. The logic behind grooming at night is two-fold; we are interested in achieving the setup time of the snow, but we are also concerned with skier safety. If grooming is required during the day, the ski patrol will be asked to close the specific hill that will be groomed, and again, we ask your cooperation and understanding in the implementation and management of this philosophy.

The Board of Directors has approved allocation of the equipment needed to implement this philosophy. We are looking forward to an excellent year of skiing and would appreciate comments and concerns as the year goes on.

Members who were not children of active members. It was proposed that a limited number of Junior Members be allowed to join at the same cost as present children of members. The term "limited" meant only 5 or 10 a year. The board rejected any change in the Junior Membership category. This is a problem that won't go away. As previously discussed, children of members in the U.S. are very likely to be transferred elsewhere in the country during their job career. On the other hand, young executives from other cities are transferred to nearby U.S. communities and they have no opportunity to join HoliMont except as an active member at a present cost of \$5,000. It is not realistic to expect them to join when they may be moved from Cleveland to Chicago, or Rochester to Houston. HoliMont is attractive only to those families who have achieved a permanent location, or those who expect to be in the area for an extended period of time. An extended payment may be proposed for all applicants in the below 40 age group.

The age group and makeup of the applicants for our waiting list will give us an indication of where we are today, and what changes are necessary for the long term health and growth of HoliMont.

ARTICLE III - APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP

3.1 Application for Active Membership by persons other than children of Active Members.

The following provisions shall apply to applications for Active Membership by persons other than children of Active Members:

(a) Form of Application

All Applications for Active Membership shall be in writing, accompanied by the recommendation of three Active Members acquainted with the applicant and further accompanied by a deposit on account of the initiation fee then applicable to Active Members equal to 10% thereof. If a waiting list for Active Membership is then being maintained as hereinafter provided, the foregoing deposit on account of the initiation fee of the applicant need not accompany such application.

(b) Consideration by Membership Committee

All Applications for Active Membership shall be referred to the Membership Committee which shall make such investigations concerning the qualifications and desirability of the applicant as it deems necessary and advisable and shall, within a reasonable time thereafter, make a recommendation upon such application to the Board of Directors.

(c) Initial Consideration by Directors

The Board of Directors, at the first meeting thereof subsequent to the submission of the recommendation of the Membership Committee, shall consider such recommendation and may reject such application or accept the same, subject to the approval of the Active Members.

(d) Consideration by Members

If an application for Active Membership is approved by the Board of Directors upon its initial consideration thereof, then forthwith all Active and Junior Members shall be notified by mail of such application. Any Active or Junior Member not desiring such applicant to become a member may, within fifteen days after receiving such notice, notify the Secretary in writing that he objects to such applicant, stating the reason or reasons for such objection if he considers such reason or reasons useful to the Board of Directors.

(e) Final Consideration by Directors

At the first meeting of the Board of Directors held at least fifteen days after notice of any application for Active Membership is mailed to the Active and Junior Members, the Board of Directors shall again consider such application. If five or more objections to such application were received from the Active and Junior Members, such application shall be denied by the Board of Directors unless 2/3 of the members of the Board of Directors present and voting at such meeting approve of the same, when such application shall be finally accepted. If less than five objections were received from the Active and Junior Members, the Board of Directors may, by simple majority of the members thereof present and voting, accept or deny such application. Upon the application of any Directors under the provisions of this paragraph, the applicant shall become an Active Member only upon payment of the balance of the initiation fee then applicable, or upon payment of the balance of the first instalment payable on account of such initiation fee, if the applicant has elected to pay such fee upon any instalment basis then available.

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REPORT ON THE ANNUAL MEETING OCTOBER 6, 1984: TED TARBELL

It was a beautiful day. The turnout at the annual meeting was overwhelming-- in excess of 350 members represented either in person or by proxy. The Board of Directors was very pleased with the response. (We apologize for the delay in registration. Next year we will have a faster system.)

Each director gave a report on his area of responsibility. Jack Swanson started with an upbeat financial report including advice that the new lift is paid for, the Club has no debt, current projects are being paid for as completed and the Club has money in the bank!

Mike Duffy gave us a run-down on the work done this summer and projects yet to be completed. The cost of major projects this year totals close to \$250,000. Some of them you won't see because they are in the ground: i.e. snowmaking lines at Sunrise East and other areas not previously covered, and a variable speed drive and new slats for the chairs at the Exhibition Lift. The latter improvement will make the Lift easier and safer, especially for beginners, to load. Six new snow makers have been added, giving us a total of 13. We have purchased a second, slightly used, Piston Bully and new grooming devices for both machines.

Mike McCulloch reported that accidents were down again last year. He urged us to continue to ski safely and to encourage our guests to do the same.

Don Richardson brought us up to date on kitchen renovations in the Main Chalet. He got applause when he announced that Joe and Val of Peppi's Pizza who had done such a great job the year before last will be back for the next three years.

Bill Althans announced that the five guests per family is still the rule. He appealed to members to cancel as soon as possible any reservations that will not be used.

Jack South reviewed the procedures for the waiting list and set the date for the drawing of names for the list. Norm Byrne Jr. reported on junior memberships. Dave Pitkin introduced Jack Kramer, head of the Ski School, and Mike Staniforth, Racing Club Coach.

In recognition of their service on the Board, I presented retiring Directors Walt Brownell and Mike McCulloch the traditional engraved pewter beer mugs. Both have made great contributions to Holimont. Walt most recently served as 20th Anniversary Chair. Mike has headed the committee that is credited with our improving safety performance. We will miss them both on the Board,

ANNUAL MEETING REPORT : Continued .

The following members were elected for three year terms: Hal Pringle, Gerry Grassi, Mike Francesco, Dave Hector and Ted Tarbell. Pringle and Grassi are new to the Board. Pringle is from Ancaster and Grassi from Rochester. The balance were reelected. Paul Philp headed the Nominating Committee.

A Motion to amend the bylaws to provide for reduced fees for members over 65 who have been members for over ten years was adopted by an almost unanimous vote. The amendment reduces fees to 50% for members over 65 and eliminates fees for members over 70. Members affected are entitled to two lift passes only.

A Motion to amend the bylaws to maintain parity between active members from the U.S. and Canada was debated in a lively fashion and then passed by a comfortable margin (41 opposed). The amendment establishes the principle that active members will be 50% from Canada and 50% from the U.S. The amendment does not affect junior members in any way. It has no effect on the right of Junior members to become active members.

I would like to thank all the directors and officers for their hard work, help and guidance the last two years. Many many things were accomplished. And they did the work.

There are numerous other people helping in the operation of the Club that I would like to recognize:

Reta Schroeder who spent many hours putting the Leaf together and doing such a credible job of keeping the members informed. (The good news is that she is willing to continue!)

Pat and Jim Sutter who, assisted by the Fredericks' and the Piccolis', provided all the great parties last year.

Scotty Lavtar who saw to it that we had many days of excellent skiing.

Barbara Lavtar who patiently and competently sold tickets, issued lift passes and did all the innumerable other chores necessary to running the office.

The members of the Hill Committee, Don Cutler, Bill Smith and Dave Reilly, who gave time and talent so generously to help Scotty and Mike Duffy provide us with great skiing.

The ski patrol under the direction of George Kassman who did their usual superb job of handling accidents and promoting safety.

Dick Waterous and Dick Walters who did a great job of handling the amendments to the bylaws.

Paul Philp and the Nominating Committee for their work in finding promising new candidates for the Board of Directors.


Pete Widger, new to Holimont and working only part-time this summer, for his help in getting the heavy work load completed before winter.

That final race was a throw-out for both Swanson and the Italians. Swanson tied for first place overall with a team from the University of Notre Dame, but won on a tie-breaker because she had the better finishes. The Italians wound up in third place overall.

The victory qualifies Swanson to compete in the World Lightning Class Championships next year in Beach Haven, N.J.

A WORD ABOUT EQUIPMENT. If you are planning on buying new equipment for your kids (or anyone else): Skis should be 3 or 4 inches taller than the child (a bit more for adults) and be flexible; Poles should have handles with straps that wrap around the wrist, not grips that encase the hand; Boots should naturally cant the leg forward and have some forward flexibility; Bindings should match the skier's weight, be compatible with the boots, and have shock-absorbing capability.

WE SAVED THE MOST IMPORTANT POINT FOR LAST. For those of you who aren't already two months into your training program -- better late than never. You will ski better, race faster, and enjoy it more if you are in better shape. Running (especially down hills), hiking, bicycling, soccer, bench hops, skipping, etc. are all good. But they are all useless if only thought about. Start a regular exercise program today and while you're doing it....THINK SNOW.




The Speed Factor

If you are a "hot shot" skier, try not to frighten other skiers by cutting tolerances too close—be courteous and understanding. We were all beginners at one point. Be aware that better conditions on one particular slope may cause everyone to seek the same snow. Again, be courteous and control yourself so as not to injure yourself or someone else.

Don't hesitate to reprimand a fellow skier who, in your opinion, has violated common sense, courtesy, and safety codes. You have a responsibility to look out for yourself. We do not "police" the slopes.

Senior Membership

As you know, we have recently created a membership category for those members who are 65 years old and who have been an active member for the last 10 years immediately preceding their 65th birthday.

For those who qualify by reaching their 65th birthday and having had at least 10 years of active membership, the dues will be 1/2 of the regular dues. For those reaching age 70 and qualifying under the 10 year provision, all dues are forgiven.

Membership in the Senior Membership category is optional, and must be applied for by the person desiring it.

To receive the Senior Membership status, you must be 65 years old by October 1st preceding the ski season. You must apply to the Membership Chairman and provide proof of age, such as a copy of your driver's license, birth certificate, or some other similarly official document.

To qualify for the current season, your request and proof of age should be sent to me at P. O. Box 747, Ellicottville, NY 14731 prior to January 1, 1985. In future years, application must be made prior to July 1st.

Once you provide the proof of age and apply for this membership category, it will automatically be renewed in future years, unless you would request a change.

The one limitation on this membership is that you only qualify for two lift passes. If your situation is such that you require more than two lift passes, you may want to retain active membership status.

14. Observe parking signs & don't block unloading areas around the Chalet.
15. Use of juke box and games not permitted during skiing hours.
16. Notices must only be put on boards provided.
17. Decorations: use hooks & wires provided. NO tacks, nails or tape.
