PETE WIDGER - A PROFILE

"Sure I know Pete Widger," said one old fogy. "He taught my kids to ski at Holiday Valley in the early sixties."

"Couldn't be," said the next fellow. "From behind the counter at Little Valley Materials he sold me lumber and nails to build my home."

"Nonsense," was the comment from the lady at his elbow. "He was too busy running the Ames House; it belongs to Mary and Marty Dolan now, but it was a friendly ski lodge when we first skied in Ellicottville."

"You're all wrong," said a newcomer. "The Pete Widger I know was a bearded red-headed chap who built my ski chalet."

"There was a Pete who fits that description who taught skiing at HoliMont one year when Dick Ferrick directed the Ski School," another recalled.



Of course they were all right. He's the same Pete Widger who is now HoliMont's ubiquitous smiling General Manager.

Pete was literally born in Ellicottville. In those days, No. 41 Elizabeth Street was a maternity home, and Pete's Aunt Josie, a registered nurse, assisted in delivering babies, including Pete.

Pete's skiing days date at least back to the rope tow on Greer Hill (Greer is the wooded steep slope east of Sunrise) when he was 12 or 13 years old and already enthused about racing. That enthusiasm carried over into the years when he was Assistant Ski School Director at Holiday Valley, in charge of the program Mondays through Fridays. (Dick Ferrick took charge on weekends.) A beer-drinking skier from Cleveland used to arrange Carling-sponsored races at H.V., where the instructors participated in the competition in preparation for a big race at the annual get-together of ski instructors from all over the east. The result was that one year the H.V. team of pros, with Pete as their "big gun," won a long slalom relay at Bel Ayre, beating out the big mountain people from Stowe and Snow.

We've all seen Pete hiking up and down HoliMont, forgoing the luxury of snowcat or snowmobile. It's not unusual for snowmakers or lift attendants to be startled by Pete's appearing in hiking boots, aided by ski poles, as he makes the rounds of the area, checking on equipment and operation. His love of walking kept him on the move in the years, starting in 1959, when he taught at H.V.; at the same time he was also working with his cousin on their dairy farm in Ashford Junction. He'd rise at 4 a.m. and by 5 a.m. he'd be milking cows; he's return home in time to shower, walk to H.V. to teach skiing all day, walk home again and return to the farm for the evening milking.

Pete majored in farm power machinery at Alfred Tech where he met Carolyn, a business major from East Aurora. After graduation he worked for International Harvester for a year, then returned to Ellicottville to join his cousin, John Widger, in the farm business and marry Carolyn (not necessarily in that order).

In the four years when he was managing and renovating the Ames House (in that ancient time, the group of which Pete was a part bought the house for \$8000.), Pete and Carolyn were raising four toddlers: Mike, Dan, Amy and Kerry. Carolyn's sense of humor made it possible for her to care for 4 small children, 40 houseguests on ski weekends, and handle the business side of the venture too. In fact, Carolyn has been behind the scenes in every venture on which Pete embarked. These days she's still taking care of the books for Pete's construction business, now headed by son Mike. She also can be seen in the Ellicottville Pharmacy, sometimes buried in the bookkeeping there.

The four children are all grown now and have even made Pete and Carolyn threetime grandparents. Kerry, the youngest, will soon finish college at Oswego and continue her studies at the University of Buffalo.

Pete's cheery personality and charming approach to people have always made him someone who's easy to work with, work for, or be with. But on his time off he is likely to seek solitude in remote woods and mountains, often hiking with Carolyn in the local area or vacationing on a camping trip to West Virginia.

His old habit of rising before 4:30 a.m. is still with him, even on his days off. He's usually at HoliMont by 5 a.m. as those of us who check the ski report can attest.

Pete's duties at HoliMont have involved not only the day-to-day chores of supervising everything from snowmaking to parking to office management to house cleaning, but also the planning of future slopes, lifts, and — this year — the construction of our Chalet addition. Somehow he manages to handle everything from detailed minutiae to the big picture and still keep his cool. But don't test that last statement by putting your feet on a coffee table!

- 4) No animals are allowed in the chalet.
- 5) Skis and poles are not allowed in the chalet.

Again -- this is only a partial list. Please read and observe the rules as posted on the bulletin board.


Please avoid making phone reservations on Saturday and Sunday between 8:30 AM and noon, as the ticket office is very busy at that time.


As a result of the increase in attendance, the Board of Directors and the Social Committee feel it necessary to develop a few guidelines to ensure the success of all future social events.

Along with several organizational revisions the following general guidelines will now be in practice:

- All people attending all parties will be required to buy their tickets in advance. Tickets will be sold in the front foyer of the Chalet. No tickets will be sold at the door.
- 2) Members must wear their lift passes as well as present a ticket to gain admission.
- 3) Guests will be admitted only with a ticket and when accompanied by a Member.
- 4) There will be a limited number of tickets sold for each party. If the function includes dinner, there will be a limited number of dinner tickets and a limited number of tickets sold for admission after dinner.
- 5) No alcoholic beverages will be dispensed to persons under 21 years of age.

 The cooperation of all Members will be required to enable the Social Committee to enforce this New York State Law. Parents are asked to enforce this with their children.

With the cooperation and support of all HoliMont members, social events in our new facility will continue to run as smoothly as they have in the past. We welcome your constructive comments and suggestions.

Now available, with PSIA Certified Instructors, we will have half day private lessons. Video analysis of your skiing is also available. Another new program is that of Improving Your Free Skiing Through Racing Techniques. No need to worry about gates smashing your arms and face. Use the Ski School's innovative progression to improve your skiing. This will be available Wednesday, Friday and Saturday afternoons.

On February 6-7 there will be a Telemark Clinic (that's cool turns on cross country skis for those who might wonder) This will be run by fully Certified Telemark & Alpine Instructors. The cost is \$35 for one day and \$55 for two. All equipment will be supplied for the morning introductory lessons and afternoon free skiing. There will also be a video review for PROOF that you can master the hill in more ways than one. Register at the Ski School Desk but remember space is limited.

2) We would like to accept gifts through Jan. 31st. (We need the time to match and list gift items for the big night.)


3) Gifts may be in the form of money (to be used in the night's program), general merchandise such as a bottle of cheer, or a gift certificate from a retail outlet.

All of our encounters with fellow members and guests should be performed in a courteous, responsible way -- never arrogant, never intimidating.


The growth and success of HoliMont, now and in the future, is very much dependent on our involvement to continually make it an enjoyable experience for everyone.





In accordance with Article III, Section 3.1(d) and 3.2(c) of the By-Laws, any member having reason to object to any of the above applicants has fifteen days to notify the secretary in writing stating those objections.

Spouse

The Board of Directors has voted to increase the initiation fee to join HoliMont to \$7000. U.S. The vested interest of existing members has increased over \$2,000,000. since the last initiation fee increase in 1985. This warrants the increase in the entrance cost to new members.

The payment included with new applications will be \$700. U.S.

The increase will affect all persons on the waiting lists.

The Junior Membership initiation fee has been increased to \$3500. Payments can be made by installments until age 33, as in the past.




A PEEK AT STATISTICS

Straight from the horse's mouth (i.e., the computer)
- Ginny Walters

Some comments in last month's HoliLeaf utilized some approximate membership numbers to make a point, but the computer reveals more accurately:

- * We have 876 members, of which 288 are Junior Members.
- * About 25% of Junior Members are on single, rather than family, memberships.
- * Twenty of our members are 65 or older, so presumably they and their spouses spend less time skiing on the weekends, thus they tax our facilities less.
- * We have 1099 children eligible for ski passes. Of these, 115 are under three years old. Although these are more children than we've had in recent years, it brings us only up to the level (1090 children) that we had ten years ago: in 1977-78!
- * We average 3.0 passes per family, down from 4.3 in 1978-79 (the first year for which your statistician has records).
- * We've issued 2290 ski passes so far this year, compared to 2003 in 1978-79 when we had only two chairlifts (Exhibition and Plum Creek).







should be aware that our snowgroomer drivers are terrified of a collision, which would almost certainly be fatal.

Visibility is poor from a grooming machine, especially on a dark, snowy night. Such machines cannot stop on a dime.

Tobogganers and sliders <u>MUST</u> stay off hills that are being groomed.

It is a real pleasure to receive the HoliLeaf. After all it was sort of my baby, many years ago when we started with one sheet and gradually grew to four pages. I also had the satisfaction of naming it The HoliLeaf, and was pleased to get a professional logo which you still use, done by Lou Poremba, for free.

It is good to read about Pete Widger as manager. When Pete was a pup, I took a picture of him skiing on Greer Hill [Ed. note: that's the slope just east of Sunrise] in his tee shirt on a bright sunny day doing a classic turn half way down the hill, with his red crew cut straining the breeze. 

A FEW WORDS FROM THE HILL COMMITTEE

- Dick Ferrick

People continually ask questions — and most of them are good questions — on how we make snow, where we make it, why we don't run the groomers during the day, etc. From time to time in the HoliLeaf we'll try to address these questions. Sometimes straightforward answers are difficult because our frequent weather changes require varying solutions.

This year we've had a number of thaws that caused us to lose a lot of base and also added a lot of moisture to the snow. Then when the temperature drops ice develops and the skiing becomes very firm. At this point we use our tillers and/or powder-makers. The tillers do a great job. However they grind the snow (or ice, etc.) to a depth of three to four inches; by noon most of this is pushed into piles or small moguls and ice develops again. The next night we can do the same with the tiller. But each time we lose a little base, so if we do this every night our base will be reduced. Because of our need to conserve snow, occasionally ground-up chunks of frozen snow known as "death cookies" appear. We try to grind these up with our powder-maker which does not use up our base as quickly as the roto-tiller does.

Some people have suggested using the groomers during the day. This is unsafe and is impossible to control from a safety point of view.

A question was asked about making snow in crossover areas and at the bottom and tops of lifts. We must do this so that people and equipment can get back and forth from one part of the area to another. We must make plenty of snow at the top and bottom in order to keep the loading and unloading areas well covered.

With our snowmaking system we require low humidity and we cannot make good snow above 28 degrees Fahrenheit. We cannot compare our system to that of Holiday Valley which is an entirely different snowmaking system with a much larger capacity and considerably larger investment. Thus on the steeper slopes they can develop a base much more quickly, allowing them to roto-till more frequently. Steeper slopes require a much deeper base than the gentler slopes. Steeper slopes are also more difficult to groom in icy conditions. We do run our groomers every night and are always looking for better ways to do the job. We have become snow farmers, because this year we have had very little natural snow and many thaws.

Today -- Tuesday, March 1st -- was a great ski day and I skied at The Valley. It was groomed in the morning but icy by 1 p.m. I thought it was great.

[Editor's note: Ferrick is the one who says that skiing is never bad, but some days are better than others, and what we're striving for is to make <u>all</u> days better than others.]


We've all watched toddlers at HoliMont learning to ski with a restraining rope around the waist. Usually a parent holds the uphill end, controlling the little skier's speed from above.

FROM THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

In 1985 the Membership Committee recommended to the Board of Directors that fifty new members be accepted each year for the following five years. We do not envision that this program will put many more skiers on the hill, as most of our waiting list people have been regular HoliMont skiers in the past. We need skiers in order to maintain our excellent facilities, but we prefer having skiers who are members, rather than guests, so that we can draw on our membership strength for help, expertise, enthusiasm and financial support. Thus we are aiming to broaden the base of our membership, but limit the number of guests, in order to foster a true Club feeling, ensuring respect for each other and for the rules and regulations of the Club. In addition, our membership expansion program will continue to help our financial planning, enabling us to increase the size of the Chalet, improve snowmaking capacity, reconstruct the roads, increase parking, and purchase more grooming equipment. We are presently in the third year of this plan.

In accordance with these aims, the Membership Committee, with the support of the Board, is working on ways to better control the number of guests on weekends. In cooperation with the Operations Committee we have started this year to put guests' names in our computer, so we can easily determine who has been a weekend guest and how many days the guest has skied at HoliMont.

The Operations Committee will continue to monitor the names of guests and their frequency of use of the facilities so that we can take appropriate action to limit the number of guests and the overuse of guest privileges by an individual.

The Membership Committee has plans to welcome new members to the Club in special get-acquainted sessions. Newcomers will be made aware of the privileges and responsibilities of all members and will be encouraged to get involved in Club activities. In addition, the Membership and Social Committees have joined in promoting "Getting to Know You" evenings during next year's season (see Social calendar).

TREASURER'S UPDATE

The ski season has ended and your Board is pleased to report that our finances are in good shape.

We did not receive as much natural snow as is normal and we had several wide temperature fluctuations accompanied by rain. These conditions required increased expenditures for snowmaking and grooming. Fortunately our income increased as well, with the bottom line being very close to our budgeted number.

During March the Board approved the Capital Budget for the 88/89 season. It includes Sunset Pond, some finishing touches to the Chalet, an extensive addition to our snowmaking capabilities in the entire area, an addition to the garage to better store and service our grooming machines and snowmaking equipment, a replacement for the Imp, road improvements from the entrance through to the exit and other smaller projects. If all goes according to plan we should complete this ambitious program of improvements with no debt at the end of the 88/89 season.

With the early passage of the Capital Budget, Pete Widger, his staff, and the Hill Committee have been able to make some excellent savings by buying equipment now rather than later in the summer. This positive move means that we will end the current year on June 30th with some modest debt, for which we borrow at prime. This will be repaid in July when we receive your dues. By the way, the dues structure for next year remains the same as this year, with Active Members paying \$600.00.

Many HoliMont patrollers have enjoyed or have planned western ski trips this year. Skiing in the Rockies has been super. What a grand way to end a good season! There will be plenty of stories to tell at our annual banquet in April. Have a happy, safe summer.

ON SUNSET POND



We are not so fortunate that we have a cast such as Henry Fonda, Jane Fonda or Kathryn Hepburn involved in this production but our players are just as hard working and dedicated to the success of "SUNSET POND."

As always is the case here at HoliMont, there is much conversation and concern about the various projects being planned for the future of HoliMont and its members.

Many of us have our own visions of what the pond at the base of the Sunset slope will look like. We also wonder how it will be used. There are questions, we are sure, as to whether it is even a good idea or why we are even doing it.

Some of us envision sitting in a canoe (or sailboat) possibly with a fishing line dangling in hopes of catching a bass or trout. Some of us envision a very large body of water; some might envision an area like our favorite old swimming hole; some may even envision all kinds of water sports; and probably some of us envision a pond similar to the one in our own backyard.

We would like to explain just how the pond will be constructed and provide you with as much information as we can, so that everyone can fully understand what this water storage project will be able to do for HoliMont, for the Town and Village of Ellicottville and for the individual members.

Sunset Pond will serve as a multi-purpose structure. It will enhance the area aesthetically, provide additional water for snowmaking, and function as a flood-retarding device reducing the amount of run-off leaving the development site at times of heavy rainfall. Plum Creek will continue to follow the present path with a portion of flow diverted into Sunset Pond to maintain a fresh supply of crystal clear water. The water level of the pond will fluctuate slightly depending on the needs. It will be maintained at full level when the need is to provide a water supply for making snow. The water level will be dropped at times when historic records indicate the need for storing run-off water. The latter purpose will assist in reducing flood waters in the Village. In other words, Sunset Pond will catch water run-off from this water shed and release it at a controlled rate.

We have had the good fortune of working closely with the Town of Ellicottville Planning Board, The Town of Ellicottville Engineer, our own engineers and some of the members of HoliMont with experience in this field. The amount of genuine effort, along with good common sense input, has been very productive. It is apparent that through our combined efforts the pond project will satisfy all the various concerns.

Rodney Sergel, who serves on the Town of Ellicottville Planning Board, was extremely helpful and contributed a great deal toward devising a plan for this water storage project. Rod is the Director of the Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service for the County of Cattaraugus. His expertise in hydrology is very impressive and his credentials are equally impressive. Rod "is delighted to see that HoliMont is planning for the future as well as creating ways that the Village and Town can enjoy a reduced flow rather than a rapid run-off creating flooding." Rod is also looking forward, along with the rest of the Planning Board of the Town of Ellicottville, to establishing a procedure whereby all developers will be required to construct water storage areas to reduce the quick influx of water into streams that flow through the Town and Village.

Mark Alianello, the Town of Ellicottville's very busy Engineer, was equally pleased that HoliMont would commit to developing ways of controlling water run-off. He has encouraged the Town of Ellicottville, and HoliMont, from the beginning of his career in Ellicottville to come up with solutions to the quick run-off of water inherent with slope cutting, roads, parking lots and buildings in and around the Ellicottville total area. Mark says, "With proper management by HoliMont, Sunset

Pond can serve to substantially alleviate the run-off problem. It is a good start in the right direction." He also is working closely with the Town of Ellicottville Planning Board relative to requirements for water storage retention areas.

We compliment Edwards and Moncrief, of Springville, New York, who have done all of the engineering and actual design of the retention area. They have engineered various projects for HoliMont over the past few years and as always we are pleased with the results. Lee Edwards, a member of the firm, was responsible for the design of Sunset Pond. He has worked diligently the past several years with HoliMont and his firm is very familiar with all aspects of this area.

The primary reason for Sunset Pond then is to control and restrict storm water run-off into the Plum Creek stream at high intensity times of year when quick run-off is a real potential problem for the area in and around and including Ellicottville.

The secondary benefits are many and some of our visions are very possible. There also are some other benefits to HoliMont which maybe we haven't even imagined.

We will define as many of the distinct advantages that will result from the Sunset Pond being there. These will not be in any priority sequence. We will let all of you decide what the priorities are going to be and it will be interesting to see how that will develop.

We will be able to have fish in the pond because fresh water will always be maintained. The amount of excess water at high level will occur usually in the winter. This will allow us to expand our snowmaking capabilities so we can produce more snow, cover a larger area, and do all this at a faster rate. Ideally we will be able to concentrate our snowmaking efforts in the east covering virtually twice as much area faster as a result of having more water to work with. This will be most important in the early part of December when we are trying to provide as much area to ski as possible for the Christmas Holidays. We can then establish base on the Sunset slope so that can be enjoyed by all throughout the ski season.

We are sure that the property owners in and around the Sunset area will also welcome the fact that the pond will be a beautiful addition to an already picturesque area. Another benefit to the immediate area is having a body of water close to homes and providing easy access for the firemen if it is ever needed.

The tow path bordering the pond will be constructed so we can mow and maintain the path for people to use for jogging. The calculation is that five times around the pond will equal a mile. We expect many people will enjoy this added feature.

All in all, it appears that through the careful planning and efforts of the various Boards, Engineers and our own Long-Range Planning Committee, a multi-purpose pond has been created.

As you can see it is not just a pond but instead an ingredient necessary to HoliMont's growth, protective of the Town and Village and enhancing the beautiful countryside present in this setting.

Our thanks go out to all of those players who took part in this endeavor. We also hope the readers feel better informed as to the project. More importantly we invite you all to be present for the curtain call which will be the actual sunset "ON SUNSET POND."

INSURANCE - HELP!

As you recall, last year HoliMont and the other members of the ski fraternity worked closely with our legislators in Albany in an attempt to have a bill passed establishing the responsibility and obligation of skiers and ski area operators. Many of you signed a petition supporting such legislation. After passing the State Senate with only one dissenting vote, unfortunately the bill was bottled up in committee in the Assembly and never reached the floor for a vote.

Similar laws have been enacted in Canada, most of the New England

states, Michigan, Colorado, etc.

We are again trying to have this law passed. Bill #5739B has passed the Senate overwhelmingly. Senator Jess Present, who represents Ellicottville, was a co-sponsor of the bill.

An identical bill has been introduced by Matt Murphy of Lockport as Assembly Bill #8448. Pat McGee, our Assembly Member for the 149th District, reports that in a recent questionnaire sent throughout her district, 92% were in favor of this legislation.

We urge all New York State members to do the following:

- * Write a letter to your representative in the Assembly urging support of Bill #8448 regarding the establishment of responsibility and the obligation of skiers and ski area operators.
- * Write a letter to your Senator thanking him for supporting Bill #5739.





Lena and her mother could then be seen going to their places with Mrs. Reynolds usually wearing a baseball cap atop her beautiful white hair.

Gary Parsons might be on the mound, Dan Gambrill behind the plate, Chris Ruszkowski on first, Steve Ruszkowski in the field, and Noble Parsons at bat. Giggles, cheers, clapping, pop corn, and lots of fun could be heard coming from the yard as Mrs. Reynolds and Lena encouraged them on. Mrs. Reynolds not only encouraged these little boys in their batting, catching, throwing, and running, but she could often be heard telling them to eat their vegetables too so that they would grow up big and strong as well.

Occasionally a ball thrown wildly or a pitch that was really hit got away and Sue Parsons would find another baseball in her kitchen. Mr. Gambrill was then called quickly, and soon a new window was in place. The large barn that lined one side of their field also had 30 small window panes that were available, and John Parsons had to replace quite a few of them before they moved to their new house further up Jefferson Street.

Mrs. Reynolds had a real love for baseball and she passed this love on to her daughter Lena as well. For the past three years a very familiar and regular fan at the varsity games is Lena Reynolds. The boys look for her at the games and would miss her greatly if she were not there. Some days you might not recognize her wrapped in blankets and winter clothing, but she has sat through games in snow, hail, sleet, wind, rain, extreme cold, and sunshine to support and encourage our team. The familiar face with the beautiful white hair and baseball cap would be there too if she could, but I'm very sure she would be proud of these fine young men and the ones that have joined them to make up the team. She would also never regret the start they had in her yard or the inspiration she gave. 

Marguerite Annis - Ellicottville's Finest

Combine intelligence, wit, perseverance, dignity and a zest for living and you have Marguerite Annis. Born December 19, 1899 in Watertown, New York to Mary and John Fisher, she has been living life to the fullest ever since. She was one of 7 children, the first from the youngest, and today is the only survivor. Her father's vocation took her to Batavia and Niagara Falls for her childhood years. Upon completion of high school, she received a scholarship to Albany State College where she received her degree with a double major in Latin and mathematics. The year 1921 brought her to Ellicottville where she began teaching Latin, spelling, and drawing in the 1887 Building (Jennie Bickell was one of her students.) She met and married L. Gardner Annis, an Ellicottville native, in 1924. Gardner was a clerk at the Bank of Ellicottville which is now the M&T Bank. The couple had one daughter, Frances Bell, now Mrs. Dean Morton. The family numbers have swelled since. Marguerite has 4 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. The Annis marriage was a truly happy one. Marguerite says lovingly, "We did everything together." When they were first married, in addition to his job at the bank, Gardner sold battery operated radios and Marguerite assembled them at their home at 23 Jefferson Street. They developed pictures for people and took chauffeur's license pictures. They prepared income taxes for many of the farmers in the area for more than 30 years. They bought property on Lime Lake and built cottages for rent. Marguerite and Gardner would work together to prepare for each renter.

In 1942 the couple bought a grocery store at the corner of Elizabeth and W. Washington Streets. It had been formerly owned by a Mr. Craig. The name was changed to L.G.'s Store and became most successful, so much so that Gardner had to leave his bank job to handle the business. Marguerite and he worked side by side 7 days a week and many nights. They still managed to share many good times with friends and especially enjoyed parties.

In 1957 a new challenge presented itself. Both Gardner and Marguerite were to take the Civil Service Exam for the position of Postmaster of When the pair arrived in Olean where the exam was being Ellicottville. offered, the administer informed them that if only one person had come, he would not be able to offer it. Talk about fate! Guess who came out with the highest score? Marguerite, of course. She urged her husband to take the Postmaster position however, and from 1957-1972 he served in that capacity. She urged her husband to take the Marguerite took the clerk exam and substituted at the Post Office when needed. They attended all the Post Office conventions, -- state and Marguerite had joined Eastern Star and Gardner was a 32nd degree Mason so they attended those conventions as well. Gardner's association with Ellicottville Volunteer Fire Department from the age of 18 until his death led to more conventions, and Marguerite still offers her garage when its held in Ellicottville. The Annis' knew everyone and were active in the Chamber of Commerce.

I asked Marguerite how Ellicottville had changed over the years. She said, "Everybody used to know everyone else and it was a more intimate village. Now it is quite cosmopolitan. I miss the many stately mansions that have succumbed to disrepair or have been torn down."

As she was ensconced in her cozy trailer on Route 219, I asked Marguerite what she did for fun. She and daughter Frances attend Eastern Star Meetings; Friday night fish fries and steak bakes at the Legion are a must. She goes to Echo everyday at the United Church of which she is a member, she enjoys reading, crossword puzzles and TV. She attends senior citizen functions, and she still drives her Chevrolet Citation downtown to do shopping and other chores. During the winter months she thinks nothing of shoveling her front steps so she can get to her waiting Chevy. Marguerite Annis is indeed one of Ellicottville's finest!



A Tribute to the Memory of the Rev. Gilbert E. Laidlaw

The Rev. Gilbert E. Laidlaw, or Father Gil as he was affectionately known by his congregation at St. John's Episcopal Church, died Sunday, April 24 in WCA hospital, Jamestown, N.Y. of a massive heart attack. He will be sadly missed by his congregation and his many friends. The Rev. Laidlaw, a 1948 graduate of Ellicottville Central School, received a B.A. from Cornell, and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Kenyon College. He was Deacon of Trinity Church, Hamburg, N.Y., Curate of St. Luke's in Jamestown, where he was ordained priest in 1956. He served as Vicar of Holy Apostles, Perry, N.Y. from 1957 to 1962, Vicar of Christ Church, Calumet Michigan, 1962-1968, Dean of Grace Church Cathedral, Menominee, Mich. 1968-1972. From 1972 to 1980, Rev. Laidlaw was Curate of St. Luke's in Jamestown. He had been Rector of St. John's, Ellicottville, since Nov. 1981.

The Rev. Robert Eggenschiller, Rector of Church of the Advent in Kenmore, N.Y., delivered the homily at the funeral and we have excerpted from this tribute:

" Gil and I, who knew each other casually as clergy of the same diocese, came to know each other more deeply and closely through the tragic illness and journey of Kay (Mrs. Laidlaw) to her own Day of Resurrection. . . . We shared the joy of marriage of his son Robert and daughter Margaret. We food and thoughts -- hopes and dreams. . . . Gil Smiled easily and warmly. He was not one of the Generals of the Church -- but he was one of her more faithful foot soldiers. He touched our lives with a calmness gentleness, despite the pain he felt and the costs he paid.. . . But his life stands by itself. There is nothing we can say that would add or detract from it. . . . We grieve our loss. . . . We sorrow as Christians, who have, to be sure, lost a loved one -- but who live in hope -- hope and belief that Gil is ever with the Lord -- hope and belief that God reigns. What will our response be to those who live in hope? Let it be a new dedication to the faith and ideals by which Gil lived.Gil has left us with the remembrance of faithful, obedient, and loving service. It is a memory which shall be a strong comfort to his family and friends."

A TIME TO GROW



Trees for planting come in three conditions: Bare-root, balled, and container grown. Which to use? It depends. Bare-root trees are less expensive because of lower digging and transportation costs. They are less readily available, though, because of nursery storage time--they must be kept dormant until planted. Some tree species do not transplant well bare-root, and must be moved with their roots in soil. Balled and burlapped trees are fresh dug, and are generally larger. Container grown trees are in pots or tubs and can be planted with minimal disturbance of their roots.





LET IT ROT!

Why bag yard and garden wastes to be hauled away to a landfill, then purchase peat moss, manure, or similar ingredients to nourish your plantings? Give composting a chance. It will succeed to some degree, no matter what. Follow some basics and you may become an enthusiast.

Usable Materials: Leaves, grass clippings, garden waste, manure, kitchen waste (exclude meat waste; it causes odors). "What comes out of the ground can go back in."

Pile: Enclosing the materials with a wire screen or wood frame contains them and facilitates thier handling.

Technique: Mix your materials with dirt or manure because they contain the micro-organisms -- nature's digestive system -- that literally chew up your waste and break it down into a usable commodity.

Do not stamp the pile down; oxygen is needed for decomposition. It will shrink naturally. Moisture is also needed, but unless your pile is under an overhang, rainfall and the large amounts of water in kitchen wastes should be sufficient.

Forking the pile occasionally is good, especially when large quantities of leaves or grass clippings are added, as they tend to compact of ferment. Shredding leaves with the mower before adding them speeds up the action.

Never put diseased materials in your pile; that's what should be bagged or burned!

Removal of Porcupine Quills

Olive Velie

This is an almost painless way to remove porcupine quills from your pet if he should have the misfortune of getting involved with a "porky." This is the method used by the Canadian Indian guides, I was told by Nadine Hughes Champyslin, whose parents ran a popular hunting and fishing lodge north of Toronto.

First, get your equipment together: a cord or nylon stocking (to gently tie the animal's mouth closed), pliers, scissors and some antiseptic like Bactine. This job requires two people, one to hold the animal and the other to do the job. (I've removed quills from the hind fetlocks of a pony, too.)

The porcupine quills are very sharp, with a fishhook end that goes easily into the flesh, but comes out very hard and painfully, because of this fishhook. Cut two or three quills on the protruding ends at <u>one</u> time, remove these with pliers straight out, and \underline{fast} . Go on to the next two or three and do the same. The cutting of the ends immediately makes the quill straighten out, thus loosing the hook and making it like a straight darning needle. It then becomes an almost painless operation.

While visiting a trail ride in Allegheny State Park last fall, I removed many quills from a beautiful Irish Setter that had followed his mistress on the ride. A crowd of people gathered around to watch, and they couldn't believe that a white haired Senior Citizen would take on such a job. I heard later that this same dog had to have this operation two more times that weekend, and some other dogs, too.

CHIVES Allium schoenoprasum, L Amaryllidaceae

Native to Northern Hemisphere Uses: Culinary, ornamental Symbolism for garden chives, "USEFULNESS"

Chives are an encouraging project for a new grower because they develop quickly and produce in profusiion. Unless you intend to use the flowers or seeds, cutting should be done before the round balls begin to develop at the top. Divide the clumps every 3-4 years to encourage vigorous

Freezing chives has proven best way to store the clipped, washed and cut, small pieces of leaves. Does not have to be thawed before use.

Fresh flowers may be used in floral arrangements. Also tasty and pretty in salads. Attractive to honey bees as well.


To dry flowers bunch and hang upside down on coat hanger in dark dry place. Cut and bunch just as buds are about to open

For windowsill garden in winter dig a plant or division and place in a 4 or 5 inch pot. Put the pot back into the soil until danger of frost then dig, put in cool place. Plant needs a resting period. In January put on sill in sunny location.






ABC Update





HOLIMONT RACING - by Skip & Greta Wilday

HoliMont racing is just around the corner and before we know it the 1988-89 ski season will be upon us. That's why now is the time to start planning for it.

We have an orientation meeting planned on Fall Festival Weekend - Sunday, October 9, 1988 at 11:00am.

Parents of past participants and those who would like to become a part of the program are encouraged to attend.

All racers should start training for next season if they haven't already. If you have any questions or would like a copy of some exercises for ski racing just drop us a note or give us a call at 716-968-1452.

Hope to see you at the meeting.

We bring most of that wood down and use it in the fireplaces during the winter months. These fireplaces use a monumental amount of firewood so the cull trees are well utilized.

LIFT & AREA M/R - All the lifts have to be maintained, repaired, painted, and of course improved as needed.

The buildings which are part of Lift Operations also have to be repaired and maintained.

All the various signs, barricades, and items used during the ski season have to be repaired, painted, and stored until next season.

The debris from the winter has to be picked up and removed from the whole area. (We could use some help from the members during the ski season to educate our guests, friends, and some members as to the House Rules relative to the whole area, including littering).

THE HOLI-BARN - Our crew has cleaned and renovated this building and the results are fantastic. It is a work shop and storage area for the Lifts and Area Control Department.

It also provides us with a carpentry shop and it appears that all the parts and equipment pertaining to the operation of our lifts can be centered in this building. There is a vast amount of work space and storage which we desperately needed.

THE SNOWMAKING SHED - Located underneath the Racing Hut building is our Snowmaker Maintenance Department. This new shop area will be used to house all the parts, tools, and some of the equipment required to maintain and repair our snowmaking machines.

Literally, every square inch of this space is presently used and very well organized. is amazing how much aparatus, parts, tools, and equipment is needed to keep our Snowmaking Department running smoothly.

AROUND THE RACING HUT - We finally have re-shaped that area and widened the cut through between the Race Hut and the island by Meadow. The springs have been drained in that whole area and more surface drainage established around the building. We still have a lot of work to do on the building such as, a new deck, stairs, and other improvements. Hopefully we will have time to make some of these improvements before winter arrives.

THE MAINTENANCE BUILDING - One of the major projects this year is the construction of the Maintenance Building. We have added onto the old garage in length, width, and height.

The main part of the building is two stories and the long new section is one story. The main building has a drive through section with very high ceilings. There is an overhead hoist in this section. Also in the lower level will be the hydraulic repairs room,

machine shop, mechanical repairs area, welding area, parts storage, bathroom, personnel room,

small lunch area, shipping and receiving room.

The upper part of this M&R area will have offices for the Maintenance and Repairs Department. The departments are Equipment & Vehicle Maintenance, Snowmaking & Grooming, (this also includes all capital on hill projects), Lifts & Area Control which includes most of the

In addition to the separate offices for the major departments we will have a small area for the on hill operations. There will be space for storage of the many items which have to be stored all summer and used only during the winter.

In the center of the office space there will be a meeting room which will serve many We expect this meeting room to be used by the various club groups and committees. We also will be able to hold staff meetings ans seminars during the ski season without disturbing any club social activities.

The one story section will be used for housing the grooming vehicles and various equipment. There are three bays and adequate room to keep most of our machinery inside out of the elements when they are not being operated. We also will be able to service and repair more then one machine at a time.

EQUIPMENT - I thought it might be of interest to the members to list the major vehicles owned and used by HoliMont to maintain the area both summer and winter.

We have 3 pisten bullies, 1 L.M.C., 2 bombardeirs, 1 tucker, and the imp. Some of these vehicles are used for both winter and summer maintenance. Two of these are used strictly for snowmaking and four are used for the major part of the grooming. We have I additional machine this year which will help out for light grooming and fill in when one of the major groomers is down for repairs. (Hopefully this will not happen).

In addition to the above we have two backhoes, two trucks, a four wheel drive tractor and many more pieces of equipment used for grooming and snowmaking.

Our snowmaking force includes 20 snowmaking machines and all the various apparatus used with them. There are several snowmobiles and a A.T.V. These are used for servicing the ski area during the winter months as I am sure you have observed.

There is a great amount of equipment to keep maintained and running. Obviously, we needed more room to store and work on these valuable items.

SKI PATROL BUILDING - We still have to construct a building at the base of Sunset for the Ski Patrol emergency room. This has not yet been started but we are planning to have something roughed in before winter.

OTHER BUILDINGS - Because of the re-arrangement of pumps we will be building three new pump houses and remodeling the others. Some of these are under construction now and we expect to complete them by November.

OFFICE EXPANSION— Some of you are aware of what goes on in the HoliMont office but most of you are not. Those of us that have seen how hectic it is during the ski season (and almost 10-11 months a year now) wonder how Barbara and her staff maintain any sanity or order.

The increase of the size of the office will accommodate many needs. The ticket booth will have three windows. (An addition of one over last year).

There will be more space and a better arrangement for the picture taking for the season pass.

The computer space will be properly and better located and not just "plopped" in the middle of the office. Included in the space will be room for the accounting and bookkeeping.

Also, there will be a work space and reference library for the Board of Directors. This space will also provide an area for them to sit down at a desk and work on their specific items.

The Business Manager's office will be relocated slightly but generally the same size. The Board room will be adequately sized to allow the full Board to meet and have access to the files and information close at hand. This room will also be available for committee meetings.

THE ROAD - At long last we are going to be able to improve the main entrance road all the way to the Chalet. The exit roads and the parking areas west of the Clubhouse Chalet will also be surfaced.

This will certainly be an improvement which everyone will notice.

We will not be re-surfacing the parking lot around the pond but that will be done sometime in the future. You will notice that the gully between the new garage and Holiville is filled and parking lot extended. We are planning to have employees, ski patrol, ski school, racing staff, and kitchen staff park in that area.

FORESTRY & LANDSCAPING - We planted another 1200 trees this year in various places around the area. These trees will not make any great impact for quite a few years but the long range plan is to continue to plant trees so that our forests remain healthy and beautiful.

We also planted larger trees around the pond, by Plum Creek fence, and here and there around the lower areas.

OFFICE - It is impossible to explain in an article like this, what Barbara has to accomplish during the off-season months. George Kuhn and Jack South can better explain all of the many tasks that Barbara performs.

I can tell you that Barbara is very busy throughout the year and as the club has grown so has the correspondence, membership mailings, invoicing, accounting and bookkeeping, reservations etc.

It is also a function of this office to see that meetings of various committees are arranged, to oversee the many projects, and to see that the proper people are kept abreast of the progress.

SUNSET & THE WOODS - More new buildings are constructed and roads and improvements taking place through out that area.

There are also more individual homes being constructed as well as some finishing touches on some that were built last year.

There is never a dull moment in and around the whole HoliMont area. Work starts early and sometimes continues until late evening. It may seem to you that the length of this article means that I have covered everything. Really, I have only scratched the surface of actually what takes place on a day-to-day basis.

The work force, committee members, Board members and all people involved are hard working and dedicated to making HoliMont a better place each year. I am also pleased to report that they are all doing a commendable job.

So remember



HOLIMONT RACING PROGRAM

Our racing program provides coaching, racing instruction, and detection and correction of faults in basic ski technique. Racers must learn to turn efficiently in order to race successfully. We deal with about 200 racers of all ages who fall into 6 major groups: 13 years and under, travelling and non-travelling; 14 and older, travelling and non; adults, hot shots and otherwise.

Competition builds character and self-respect and teaches responsibility and cooperation. The kids learn about winning and also about losing which is just as important. They are out on the hill training or racing each day. Usually they get together on Saturday nights to prepare their skis for a Sunday race, which often involves a 7:00 am departure. It is a happy, healthy, busy life for them.

Our coaches are all former racers, and attained high levels within the racing structure in either New York or Ontario. They have all attended clinics in the past and will continue to do so to keep up with current technique and methods. They are all devoted to their kids (of whatever age).

For our top racers the program begins in December with some early races which can be important for their seeding during the coming season. For the others, the season starts with Christmas Camp which runs 4 days between Christmas and New Year's, culminating in a full-fledged race and banquet with trophies and awards.

During the season, 25 to 30 of the 13 and under kids travel to races in the Niagara Frontier Ski Council on the first 6 Sundays. A Council team is selected to go to a divisional championship where a further selection is made to go to the State Championships, which have been held at Hunter Mountain.

Another 30 kids from the younger age group train and race at HoliMont each weekend in preparation for the Taylor Series in the spring which is aimed at racers not making the divisional team.

The adult group consists of former racers and experts interested in trying racing. They find gate training a new and interesting challenge and they enjoy our different approach to technique as well.

Since we attend a lot of races, we have a responsibility to run some. Each year we run an NFSC race, an Empire race, a Taylor race, the Niagara Cup, the Christmas Camp race, and the Club Championship.

Program applications and descriptions are included herewith. Please fill out and return them by December 10th.

Also, please renew your memberships in NYSSA and USSA. You must belong to USSA with a competitor's license to: be on the national points list; race in classes I & II; race in the III & IV Divisionals and State Championships. You must belong to NYSSRA for all of the above and to race in more than one Niagara Frontier Ski Council race. Note that for the III & IV Divisionals and States, the membership deadline in USSA is February 1, 1989.

Before Christmas Camp there are a few races the I & II's should try and prepare for. There is a downhill camp at Whiteface from December 19th to 22nd, with a downhill on December 22nd. On December 23rd and 24th there are two open races at Bristol and Brantling. These usually end up being tremendous opportunities to lower points.

A WORD ABOUT EQUIPMENT. If you are planning to buy new equipment for your kids(or anyone else): skis should be 3 or 4 inches taller than the child (a bit more for adults) and be flexible; poles should have handles with straps that wrap around the wrist, not grips that encase the hand; boots should naturally cant the leg forward and

have some forward flexibility; bindings should match the skier's weight, be compatible with the boots, and have shock-absorbing capability. All participants in the HoliMont program have the opportunity for a 20% discount on equipment through the Red Door Ski Shop. Upon receiving the applications we will send out cards which can be presented to the Red Door. They have a professional staff that will be able to help in selecting the right equipment.

The following is an outline of the coming season with, we hope, something for everyone. Anyone wanting to race should be able to do so at a level of their own choosing. Our program includes USSA class races, NFSC races, Taylor Series, Niagara Cup races, and improvement of basic skiing and racing skills. In these various races, a racer's class is determined by his age on December 31, 1988. If you turn 14 on January 1, you would still race as a 13-year-old.

In addition, there will be some club races at HoliMont which will include a race at the end of Christmas Training Camp.

This year there will be a Christmas Training Camp December 26th to 30th, followed by a race on the morning of the 30th. The Seasonal Program will run for 10 consecutive weekends starting on Saturday, December 31, and ending on Sunday, March 5. The Christmas Camp banquet will be held on December 30th.

Listed below are various programs and prices. These are open to all members and guests. In addition the racing center is available to all, including non-participants, if you need a place to work on your skis.

An application form is included in this 'Leaf; again we plead for a prompt response. Better and earlier information means a better program.

JUNIOR CHRISTMAS CAMP - Cost: \$65.00 Monday to Friday, December 26 - 30, 4 hours each day starting at 9:30 AM. This camp will concentrate on establishing sound skiing fundamentals as well as training in gates. Open to all junior racers.

ADULT CHRISTMAS CAMP - Cost: \$45.00 Same dates as above, 2 hours each day, starting at 10:00 AM. Training in gates or correcting technique, as required. Open to all adults.

SEASONAL PROGRAM - TRAVELLING - Cost: \$110.00 (III & IV) and \$150.00 (I & II) Coaching at all races, and 4 hours daily training at HoliMont on non-race days. Program starts on Saturday, December 31, and runs for 10 weekends. It will be extended to cover late season races as necessary. This option is for junior racers planning to participate in NFSC and USSA races.

SEASONAL PROGRAM - NON-TRAVELLING - Cost: \$85.00
Same dates as above. 2 hours coaching per day on Saturdays and Sundays starting at 9:30 AM. This program is available to racers as young as 6 (and younger if they are competent skiers) and is designed for junior racers not wishing to travel to "away" races, or those wishing to participate only in the Taylor Series.

SEASONAL PROGRAM - ADULTS/TEENS - Cost: \$75.00 (2 days) \$45.00 (1 day)
Same dates as above. 2 hours a day starting at 10:00 AM. Training in gates, dual slaloms, etc.

We are looking forward to the coming season with the support of the parents and the excellent coaching staff. The 88/89 season should be an exciting one.

NEW LAW GIVES SKIERS KEYS TO SAFE SKIING

Your skis and the automobile you drive will have much more in common this winter due to a new law, the Safety in Skiing Code, now in effect in New York State.

Drivers know that being alert to changing road conditions -- and the often unpredictable actions of other motorists -- are the keys to arriving safely. They know that trees, phone poles and bridge abutments are to be avoided, even if it means slowing down. Drivers understand that they cannot rely on snowplows and sanding trucks alone to make any highway completely safe.

Taking its cue from the laws that govern safe driving, the Safety in Skiing law requires skiers to be alert to their surroundings, including varying snow surface conditions and the actions of fellow skiers. Skiing in control to be able to slow down or stop when encountering a patch of ice are no longer just good ideas. Now they're the law.

The new law recognizes that "despite all feasible safety measures that can be taken by ski area operators," which are described in detailed State regulations, skiing, like driving, will always present skiers with the risk of being injured. Under the new law that risk, ultimately, is assumed by the skier, just as everyone accepts similar risks when driving.

According to the new law, once the ski area has made the snow, groomed the trails, padded the lift towers, and installed safety and directional signs, the responsibility of getting safely down the mountain, under all kinds of conditions, is handed over to the individual skier.

Skiers -- not ski areas -- are now responsible for mastering variations in terrain and snow cover, avoiding ice and bare spots, and avoiding collision with trees, rocks and snowmaking machines.

HoliMont, like other ski areas in New York State, is empowered to set up a Reckless Skier program, under state-specified guidelines. If you bomb a hill in a tuck or sneak a cruise down a closed trail you are inviting a revocation of your lift privilege and a requirement to take remedial safe-skier instruction. HoliMont has established a Safety and Security Committee which will work with our staff, ski patrol and members to coordinate risk management, a Reckless Skier program, and other facets of the new law. You'll hear more about these programs in the future.

Skiing has been termed a challenge of man against the mountain. Now a new challenge is added: one aimed at seeing that all skiers return time and again to enjoy the sport: the "challenge of skiing safely."
