Many HoliMonters know Jack from way back, recalling the annual meetings at which for years he presented the Club's financial picture, graphically and clearly; he never used a microphone and never needed one, with lungs probably developed from yelling "Starboard!" on the Lightning circuit.

Newcomers may not be aware that HoliMont wouldn't be what it is today if it weren't for Jack — if, indeed, it would be here at all. Jack was Treasurer for years. REAL ESTATE COMMITTEE REPORT

All of the units which were built last summer in "The Woods" have been sold. A new contract has been signed for additional condos to be constructed during the summer of 1989. These will be in the area north of the present units, adjacent to the pond and towards Route 242.

Our committee is also working on making lots available for single-family dwellings adjacent to our ski area. We will keep you posted, as there seems to be quite a demand for these.

We hope that the Sunset area will have plenty of snow for lots of skiing this year. We need more of this early winter!

WATER FOR SNOWMAKING



This is the first in a series of information reports from the Hill Committee

With the creation of the new Sunset Pond HoliMont now has three sources of water for snowmaking: the Plum Creek catch basin, the Exhibition Pond, and the Sunset Pond. All three are tied into our interconnected piping system which allows any one pump to pressurize the entire system. In other words we can pump water from west to east, east to west, or center to east and west. For example, we could pump water from Sunset Pond and feed snow gun positions anywhere between there and Sunrise.

It is estimated that the new pond adds one million gallons to our two-million-gallon reservoir. When operating all three base pumps along with the three mid-slope boost pumps, HoliMont can supply 1900 gallons per minute to

our fleet of snow guns.



RESPECT YOURSELF, RESPECT OTHERS, RESPECT THE ENVIRONMENT.



ROBERT BURNS was born in the town of Ayr, Scotland, on January 25th, 1759, to a less than affluent father, William Burness (the original spelling of the name), who acted as gardener and overseer to a neighboring gentleman. Burns, as a youth, was an avid reader, and therefore, under the tutelage of a young man named Murdoch, acquired a fairly good English education as well as a knowledge of French. His first published work, the famous Kilmarnock edition, a collection of "Poems, Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect" has been widely acclaimed as some of his finest work.

Robbie Burns' attraction to the fairer sex and his numerous affairs were well known, and it has been said that Burns was at his best when in love. Apparently, a fact, as he became a master of poetry and

song in his adult years. Eventually Burns married Jean Armour and settled down to the life of a farmer although he continued to write. Unfortunately his later years were not happy ones — his wife, often and with cause, complained of his unfaithfulness.

His writings are full of tenderness, pathos, wit and wisdom, especially those written in the dialect peculiar to the Scots. Had Robbie Burns been less of a sinner and more of a saint, he would probably not have had the same general appeal that was his during his lifetime nor now, 229 years after his death. Robbie Burns died at the age of 37 on July 21st, 1796, and was buried at Dumfries, Scotland





STAFF PROFILE -- TIM WEAVER

In these profiles we are trying to introduce you to the various people who make HoliMont click. We are not doing this in any particular order, but rather by just spotting a person you should get to know.

Tim Weaver is one of those people.

Tim has been at HoliMont now for more than two full years. He is the Snowmaking Department's number one man. He is responsible for all of the maintenance and repairs on all of the snowmaking equipment. He also is the person that has to get the snow made on time, in the right place and enough of it to provide skiing that would otherwise be impossible. This is a monumental task, but Tim takes the bull by the horns and gets the job done.

Snowmaking is only a small part of Tim's talents. He was born in Olean, NY, and grew up in that area. He is an accomplished skier and was a member of the Wing Hollow Ski Team; I am sure those of you who know him can vouch for his "ski-ability."

Tim attended Morrisville (State of NY Agricultural and Technical College), majoring in Ski Area Technology and graduating in 1984. While at Morrisville he was the captain and MVP of their ski team and on the Dean's List for four semesters.

When he presented his resume to us and we checked his references, we were informed that Tim was a young man to watch because of his first-rate mechanical and technical abilities. We are happy to report that his references were entirely accurate. His fellow workers, immediate supervisor, the Club's consulting engineers, our Committee people and his friends will tell you that Tim does first-rate work and is very knowledgeable as well as receptive to new ideas. In fact, "innovative" would be a word that would easily describe Tim.

Tim is very modest about his other accomplishments of which he should be proud. Few of you probably know that in June he won a Grand National Championship race on his personally designed and developed ATV. Tim has been on the ATV Racing Circuit for several years and not just your local fun races. No indeed!! He has been competing at the national level for the past three seasons and has been at least in the top ten many times. This year he decided to go for "all the marbles" and is now a Grand National Champion.

Tim's racing victories, riding a '88 Honda FourTrax 250R chassis powered by an ATC350X four-stroke engine, have been written up in several national magazines, most recently in <u>ATV Sports</u> (Oct. 1988).



SKI PATROL


Often at HoliMont the Ski Patrol is asked if they can fix ski bindings. The answer is, "NO, we cannot!" The proper place to adjust or fix ski equipment is not at the base of the Exhibition chair while scrambling to get in the lift line but at a qualified ski repair shop.

All equipment should be checked before putting it on the car ski rack or throwing it in the trunk and heading for the slopes. Check bindings for loose screws, lubrication, proper release for size, weight and ability of the skier and for size adjustment required for those new boots you purchased on sale at the end of last season. Check your skis for possible delamination and broken edges; check boots for broken buckles and split plastic; and check poles for missing baskets. Properly adjusted and tuned ski equipment makes for much safer and more enjoyable skiing.

Occasionally, however, a screwdriver is all you need for a small adjustment to save a trip downtown to the ski shop and enable you to catch one or two powder runs that the early birds haven't skied yet. The Patrol has a selection of screwdrivers at the Patrol window in the HoliMont chalet for any Member or guest to use. PLEASE RETURN after use. The Patrol is also available to offer advice on ski equipment.



WATER AND SNOW GUNS

The second in a series of Hill Committee reports

Starting on December 10, 1988, and for the next four days the temperature and relative humidity (RH) in Ellicottville were perfect for snowmaking. During this period HoliMont had 18 of our 20 snow guns running <u>full open</u>, until we ran out of water. Last summer's drought had resulted in a lower water table and stoppage of some natural springs so we did not receive the anticipated re-couping water necessary to refill our ponds in a timely manner in order to continue snowmaking full open.

Normally in December with 20 guns running at marginal temperatures (27 to 32 degrees Fahrenheit) and high humidity (70 to 90 RH), the pumps and guns would be using only 500 gal/min, and our water supply would not have been exhausted. But this December the 18 guns were running full open at 12 to 17 degrees F. and low humidity, consuming all of our pumping and gun capacity. During and after Christmas week the temperature rose and the ponds refilled allowing HoliMont to resume snowmaking. Barring unforeseen and unpredictable conditions, all slopes and lifts should be open before you receive this.

* * *

Editor's note: For those who haven't been here to find out: snowmaking and powdermakers have worked wonders on freezing/thawing slopes with skiing getting better all the time. The weekend of January 7-8 provided some superb skiing, and in spite of a thaw on Sunday followed by a hard freeze, the groomers gave us super conditions on Monday.

SNOWMAKING STUDY TO BE UPDATED

The HoliMont Hill Committee held an informational meeting on Saturday, January 7, 1989, regarding the status of HoliMont's snowmaking system. A number of those in attendance were interested in a study of a possible comprehensive "compressed air/water" system for use at HoliMont. The Hill Committee has had an ongoing investigation into alternative systems and welcomed Warren Wilkinson as a new committee member to help pursue further studies.

A subcommittee called the "Special Snow Committee" was formed to investigate the available alternatives to HoliMont's current snowmaking system and to submit proposals to the Hill Committee including the cost of those alternative systems. At that time a decision may be made regarding any possible changes in our current system.

The Special Snow Committee, whose focus is improving the quality of snow conditions at HoliMont, is chaired by Warren Wilkinson. Any members interested in the work of the Committee, or in assisting the Committee, should contact Warren Wilkinson at (416) 560-1823 or (716) 699-4554.



In accordance with Article III, Section 3.1(a), 3.1(d) and 3.2(c) of the By-Laws, any Member having reason to object to any of the above applicants has fifteen days to notify the Secretary in writing stating those objections.

At the present time we have 324 members living in the United States and 330 members from Canada. We had 7 resignations in 1988. In order to comply with Section 2.3, Paragraph (e), of the By-Laws, the Board of Directors has accepted 32 applicants from the United States and 25 from Canada.

SKI SAFETY

A Report from the Ski Safety Committee, Jerry Hilger, Chairman

The HoliMont Board of Directors has adopted the following policy pertaining to ski safety.

The rules are stated on the new trail map, a copy of which is enclosed with this issue of the HoliLeaf. These rules apply to both members and guests.

Violation of any of these rules may result in the following disciplinary action:

Guests

First offense: - A warning will be given; their lift pass will be marked and the violation explained to them.

Second offense: - The lift pass will be removed and the skier will be requested to leave the ski area. The name of the guest and his member host's name will be recorded.

Members

First offense: - The violation will be explained and the member's name will be recorded with the Ski Safety Committee.

Second offense or flagrant first offense: - The member's name shall be recorded; their lift pass may be removed for that day by the Safety Committee or their designee. The member shall then be notified by the Safety Committee in accordance with By-Law 4.7, and proceedings for suspension may be initiated.

In addition to the rules stated in the HoliMont trail map brochure, a skier may lose his/her ski privileges without warning for the following offenses:

- 1. Being apparently drunk
- 2. Being apparently on drugs
- 3. Serious disorderly conduct
- 4. Jumping from a chair lift
- 5. Premeditated swinging of a lift chair, T-bar, or J-bar
- 6. Major jumping, forward or backward flips
- 7. Refusing a request by a Ski Patroller, Area Manager, Director, or other authorized individual.

These rules will be enforced by Ski Patrol, Directors, Area Manager, and the Ski Safety Committee.

These rules are not new. However, as our Club expands we feel it is necessary to remind you to be courteous, to ski safely, and to inform your guests of our rules.







SPRING ADVICE from our SKI PATROL

Spring traditionally seems to be the time when members take ski trips out West to the Rockies or East to the Alps. Remember to exercise care when skiing unfamiliar slopes, which will be longer than we are used to skiing at HoliMont. Altitude sickness can affect some people, so take it easy -- especially the first day. plenty of suntan sunblock to avoid bad sunburns. an accident occurs on the slopes in Europe, remember that there will be a fee for patrol assistance, so carry a credit card. It is wise, also, to carry your ski boots on the plane. If equipment gets lost, skis and poles can be rented, but getting boots to fit may not be so easy. Wrap an extra covering around your bindings to protect them them in your Baggage handling can damage them and they are not covered by airline insurance. Have lots of fun, sun and fresh powder.



HELP!

The Ski Areas of New York, Inc. (SANY) are asking for the help of skiers and their friends who reside in New York State. A new tax proposal is being considered by the State Legislature; it would add approximately \$2.00 to the cost of a lift ticket and would tax other participant sports and services such as golf, bowling, cable television, billiards, etc.

Rob Megnin, Executive Director of SANY, said, "This is a unilateral approach to raise revenues. This may be a quick fix to the problem, but the tax can do long-term detrimental harm to the industry. Unemployment, stagnant growth and lower consumer demand are just a few of the things that could happen if such a tax is imposed."

New York State residents are urged to write to the Governor and to their legislators and to sign petitions (available at HoliMont) to protest this discriminatory law which could deal a severe blow to New York State's recreation and tourism industry. Address letters to:

SNOW GROOMING

This is one in a series of factual reports from the Hill Committee.

HoliMont's 1988-89 ski season has required the utilization of all four grooming machines matched with a complement of different grooming implements. Snow conditions and weather changed so drastically this season that no two days were the same for grooming.

HoliMont has the following moving machines:

Three Pisten Bullys, all diesel, all Mercedes Benz engines:


- 170 (engine size) bought new, with an all-way blade, compactor bar and slow-speed tiller
- 2) 200 bought used, with a fixed U blade, compactor bar, and slow-speed tiller
- 3) 270 bought used, with a fixed U blade, compactor bar, and high-speed tiller

One LMC diesel with a CAT 3700 engine

LMC bought new, with an all-way blade, compactor bar, and high-speed tiller

All four machines are equipped for our various powder makers.

With light snow conditions, you'll see the 170 and 200 using compactor bars and powder makers. For heavier, deep snow, the bigger (270 and LMC) machines come into play, tilling and grinding.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Before the end of our last ski season, your Board of Directors and our full-time HoliMont employees were busy preparing and developing plans for Capital Projects to be completed before the start of this ski season. I am happy to report that most projects are on schedule for completion this Fall.

The Number One priority project is for the development of a ten million gallon reservoir to be located on the top of the hill near the Sunset lift. The reservoir would be filled by pumping water through existing snowmaking lines from Plum Creek. A dramatic project with many benefits which will be detailed further in the Snowmaking Report. With engineering and ground clearing completed, the project is in the approval stages with New York State regulatory agencies. Good luck, early approvals, and dry weather may insure completion this year.

The beginner area (Bunny Hill) has been relocated adjacent to and west of Exhibition Lift. The area has been cleared, reshaped, and seeded to accommodate a safer and more manageable beginner hill. A Mighty Mite lift (Rope tow with handles) has been installed with easy access from the Main Chalet and relocated Ski School bell. The old beginner hill has now become an extention of Snowbird.

In addition to our annual efforts in reforestration, through the efforts of Chuck Twichell landscaping improvements have been made to our entrance, HoliBarn, Main Chalet, and new beginner slope.

A new snowmaking line on Wild Turkey as well as several new spurr lines throughout the area will help speed the snowmaking process. SnowMax equipment has been installed in hopes of increased snow production in the early part of the season.

Purchase of many shop tools, machinery, and equipment in recent years, coupled with the expertise of several dedicated self-starters has given us the capibilities to build, rebuild, fabricate, design, fix, and do just about anything to any ski area equipment the industry has to offer. A very impressive group of employees and equipment welcomes your inspection during the afternoon of our Annual Meeting.

The planning stages for additional skiing at our Sunset Area are being drawn, and a conceptual drawing will be available during OctoberFest weekend. Sightline trails (approximately 8' wide) have been cleared on those slopes to give a "skier's eye" view from all angles. Although no plans for developing the area have yet been formulated, please study the drawing, take a walking tour of the area, and give us your comments.

Dozens of additional projects including improvements to the Main Chalet, spring drains, painting and staining, new equipment, etc. will be reported at the Annual Meeting.

Looking forward to another fun-filled, snow-filled season,

Bill Merk, HoliMont Founder 1918 - May 8, 1989

Bill Merk's last official appearance at the Club was at our Twenty-Fifth Anniversary Celebration on February 25, 1989. He had seen the Club grow to what it is today from its beginnings as an idea conceived, with his wife, Freda, of a no-lift-line, reasonably priced, family ski club. With his familiarity with this area, having skied with the Ellicottville Ski Club for a number of years, Bill acquired options on the property for HoliMont, cut the first trail in 1961, and personally supervised the Exhibition Lift installation in 1964. Not only was he an imaginative planner and a graceful skier, but he also loved the apresski parties, and lent his yodel to the cappella singing. Some of Bill's reminiscences of early HoliMont days will be included in a forthcoming HoliMont History.

Bill leaves behind five children - some of them HoliMont members - and seven grandchildren of whom at least five are on skis. HoliMont shares their loss

The new hill will be serviced by a Mighty-Mite tow. The Mighty-Mite tow will be easier for the children to learn to use on their own. The hill is away from all the main traffic, so we feel it will be much safer for the little ones and older skiers just learning to ski.

In August, I was pleased to be appointed Regional Representative for the PSIA-E Children's Programs in the Western New York Area. Hopefully, this will allow me to augment our existing program at HoliMont, as well as introduce new and exciting ideas garnered from my meetings with Children's Program Directors from other areas. 


In addition a committee has been formed to study the merits of development on "the shelf". Bill Weir, Chairman, has conducted several meetings and we look forward to their conclusions in the near

78 HoliMonters played golf, or a reasonable facsimile of same, with about 25 more joining for cocktails and dinner at HoliMont.



HILL COMMITTEE REPORT

If you see our bright blue snowguns out on several of the slopes in early November, do not be surprised. We are going to be setting them out earlier and placing them for their first concentrated effort.

We also are conducting some very intense hands-on snowmaker training sessions. There is no better place to do that than on the hill. We intend to start making snow as soon as it is practical after the middle of November and when we have a good 3 to 5 day weather forecast.

We feel that with some decent cold temperatures, some early snow, and with our improved system and techniques, we should be able to cover more area faster and, hopefully, sooner. Our intention is to get as much base coverage as possible before Christmas. We also intend to keep covering the area throughout the season to provide as much skiing for as long as we can and to provide some more great spring skiing.

As of this writing we do not have final approval from NY State for the large reservior pond that has been under discussion. However, we do have alternate plans to increase our water supply at our Canfield Hill Pond.


As reported at the annual meeting our membership consists of 669 Active members, 34 Seniors, 40 Non-residents, 2 Honorary Life, and 280 Juniors.

HOLIMONT RACING PROGRAM

The Holimont Racing Program racing program provides coaching, racing instruction, and detection and correction of faults in basic ski technique. Racers must learn to turn efficiently in order to race successfully. We deal with about 200 racers of all ages who fall into 7 major groups: 12 years and under, travelling and non-traveling; 13 and 14;15 to 18, travelling and non; adults, hot shots and otherwise.

Competition builds character and self-respect, and teaches responsibility and cooperation. The kids learn about winning and also about losing which is just as important. They are out on the hill training or racing each day. Usually, they get together on Saturday nights to prepare their skis for a Sunday race, which often involves a 7:00 am departure.

Our coaches are all former racers, and attained high levels within the racing structure in either New York or Ontario. Most have attended clinics in the past and will continue to do so to keep up with current technique and methods. They are all devoted to their kids (of whatever age).

For our top racers the program begins in December with some early races which are important for their seeding during the coming season. For the others, the season starts with Christmas Camp which runs 4 days between Christmas & New Year's culminating in a full-fledged race and banquet with trophies and awards.

During the season, 25 to 30 of the 13 and under kids travel to races in the Niagara Frontier Ski Council on the first 5 Sundays. A Council team is selected to go to a divisional championship where a further selection is made to go to the State Championships, which were held at Hunter mountain.

Another 30 kids from the younger age group train and race at Holimont each weekend in preparation for the Taylor Series in the spring which is aimed at racers not making the divisional team.

The adult group consists of former racers and experts interested in trying racing. They find gate training a new & interesting challenge as well as enjoying our different approach to technique.

Since we attend a lot of races, we have a responsibility to run some. Each year we run an NFSC race, an Empire race, a Taylor race, the Christmas Camp race, and the Club Championship.

Program applications and descriptions are included. Please return completed application by December 10.

Also, please renew your memberships in NYSSA and the USSA. You must belong to USSA with a competitor's license to: be on the national points list and to race in classes I,II,and III. Racers in the IV & V also need to join the N.Y. State Ski Racing Assn. and the United States Ski Racing Assn.

Before Christmas Camp there are a few races the I & II's should try to prepare for. There is a downhill camp at Whiteface from December 18-22, with a downhill on December 22. On December 23 & 24 there are two open races at Swain & Brantling. These usually end up being tremendous opportunities to lower points.

The following is an outline of the coming season with, we hope, something for everyone. Anyone wanting to race should be able to do so at a level of their own choosing. Our program includes USSA class races, NFSC races, Taylor

Series, Niagara Cup Races, and improvement of basic skiing and racing skills. In these various races, a racer's class is determined by his age on December 31, 1989. Ie: If you turn 14 on January 1, you would still race as a 13 year old.

This year there will be Christmas Camp check-in on December 26 from 9:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. Training will begin at 1:00 p.m. on December 26 - December 29. There will be a Christmas Camp Race on the afternoon of December 29. To conclude the camp there will be a banquet on the evening of December 29.

Listed below are various programs and prices. These are open to all members and guests. In addition, the racing center is available to all, including non-participants, if you need a place to work on your skis.

JUNIOR CHRISTMAS CAMP - Cost: \$65.00 Tuesday - Friday, December 26 - 29, 4 hours each day starting at 9:30 am. This camp will concentrate on establishing sound skiing fundamentals, as well as training in gates. Open to all junior racers.

ADULT CHRISTMAS CAMP - Cost: \$45.00 Same dates as above, 2 hours each day, starting at 10:00 am. Training in gates or correcting technique, as required. Open to all adults.

SEASONAL PROGRAM-TRAVELING - Cost: \$110.00(IV), \$130.00(III), & \$150.00(II & I) Coaching at all races, and 4 hours daily training at Holimont on non-race days. Program starts on Saturday, December 30 and runs for 10 weekends. It will be extended to cover late season races as necessary. This option is for junior racers planning to participate in NFSC and USSA races.

SEASONAL PROGRAM - NON-TRAVELING - Cost: \$85.00 Same dates as above. 2 hours coaching per day on Saturdays and Sundays starting at 9:30 am. This program is available to racers as young as 6 (and younger if they are competent skiers) and is designed for junior racers not wishing to travel to "away" races, or those only wishing to participate in the Taylor Series.

SEASONAL PROGRAM - ADULTS/(TEENS) - Cost &75.00 (2 days) \$45.00 (1 day) Same dates as above. 2 hours a day starting at 10:00 am. Training in gates, dual slaloms, etc.

We are selling Holimont T-SHIRTS and SWEATSHIRTS this year. The T-SHIRTS are \$12 (US) \$14 (CAN). The SWEATSHIRTS are \$18 (US) \$20 (CAN). The sizes are adult small, medium, large and X-large.

We are looking forward to the coming season with the support of the parents and the excellent coaching staff.

The 89/90 season should be an exciting one.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

A great start for a promising ski season. Early season cold weather has enabled us to produce acres of heavy dense base snow that should last thru much of the season. Our new SNOMAX system has helped production at marginal temperatures.

Our biggest disappointment so far has been our inability to obtain permits from the State of New York to develop our 10,000,000 gallon water reservoir at the top of the hill. This was our number one priority this year, but we received little or no cooperation from regulatory agencies despite the constant pressure from our engineers and politicians. However, water levels remain good in our existing reservoirs and creeks and we will do the best with what we have. The reservoir and its additional pumping station still remain our top priority for next year.

Some may have noticed that we recently completed a automatic fire sprinkling system in our base Chalet. The system will not only protect this valuable asset but ensure the safety of our members and guests. The cost of which will be recovered in a few years through reduced insurance costs.

Management and the ski patrol has asked me to remind you and your guests not to ski in closed ski areas. These areas will be well marked and pose a risk to your safety. Violators will experience disciplinary action from the ski patrol and safety committee.

Being a Safe Skier!

New York State Law requires you to know and observe the following skier's duties:

- 1. Never ski in any area not designated for skiing.
- 2. Never ski beyond your limits or ability to overcome variations in slope, trail configuration and surface or subsurface conditions which may be caused or altered by weather, slope or trail maintenance work by the ski area operator, or skier use
- Always follow the directions of the ski area operator.
- 4. Always stay in constant control of speed and course so you can avoid striking plainly visible or clearly marked obstacles, and other skiers and passengers on surface operating ski lifts.
- Throughout the ski day, familiarize yourself with posted information before skiing any slope or trail, including all the information posted on this ski area's central information board(s).
- 6. Never cross the uphill track or any surface lift, except at points clearly designated by the ski area.
- 7. Never ski on any part of a slope or trail which has been designated as "closed" by the ski area.
- 8. Never leave the scene of any accident resulting in personal injury to another skier until such time as a representative of the ski area operator arrives, except for the purpose of summoning aid.
- Never overtake another skier in a way that you
 might strike the skier being overtaken and always
 vield the right-of-way to the skier being overtaken.
- Do Not Stop on any slope or trail where you might cause a collision with other skiers or vehicles.
- Always yield to other skiers when entering a trail or starting downhill.
- Always wear retention straps or other devices to prevent runaway skis.
- 13. Report any personal injury to the ski area operator's office before leaving the ski area.
- Never remove, deface, alter or damage signs, warning devices of safety, or the safety of other skiers.

Being a Safe Lift Passenger!

New York State Law requires you to know and observe the following passenger duties:

- Always familiarize yourself with the safe use of any lift prior to its use; if you're not sure how to get on or ride the lift, or how to get off, ask the attendant for instruction or help. If you need special assistance in using any lift, let the attendants know before you board.
- 2. Stay in or on the lift if it stops for any reason. Wait calmly until instructions or aid are provided by the ski area operator.
- 3. Always get on and off ski lifts only at points or areas designated by the ski area operator.
- Never throw any objects or material from a ski lift.
- 5. Always use restraint devices, such as safety bars, in accordance with instructions posted on the lift.
- Always wear retention straps or other devices to prevent runaway skis.
- 7. Never interfere with the operation of a ski lift.
- 8. Never place anything on the uphill track of a surface ski lift which could interfere with its normal operation including other skiers on the lift; and
- Never wear loose scarves, clothing or accessories or expose long hair which may become caught in any part of the ski lift and cause you to be injured.

After you've ridden the Lift, it's time to Ski! Always obey the Skier Duties which are also posted at this Ski Area.

Some Other Rules We Would Appreciate You Heeding

- PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE SKIS in front of or around the chalet. Please place skis in the racks provided.
- 2. Cross country skiers using the hills must buy lift tickets and have proper ski brakes or safety straps.
- 3. If you are unfamiliar with the lifts or the ski trails please ask for assistance.

A reminder that our club adheres to and enforces the above rules. The rules are stated on our trail maps and both members and guests are subject to disciplinary action if violated.



SKI SCHOOL

The following are some guidelines to follow with your HoliKids so they will have a safe and happy ski season:

CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT

Appropriate clothing - warm, flexible gloves or mittens, hats, neck warmers or face masks and warm, water-resistant clothing such as big type snow suits, ski pants, and long underwear designed so the child can take them off and put them on without assistance.

Good quality protective glasses or goggles depending on the weather conditions. Remember, children's eyes are just as sensitive as yours.

Properly fitting boots - warm comfortable boots which are easy to get into and out of. The plastic should be flexible enough to allow children to press their knees and ankles forward in the same manner you do. Children frequently ride the backs of the boots when the plastic is too stiff to flex forward comfortably.

Good quality skis and bindings - the skis should have good side cut and flex pattern. Skis should be shoulder height for beginning level skiers. The bindings should be no more than five years old and adjusted by a certified binding mechanic for the child's height, weight, and ability level. Whenever possible, find the lightest weight skis and bindings for children. Weight makes a difference, especially for young children.

Extra clothing - bring extra socks, mittens and long underwear for the wet days.

THE CHILD'S HEALTH

Children need plenty of rest when engaging in vigorous outdoor activities. Please make sure your child is well rested before bringing him to ski lessons.

It is better to overdress children than underdress them.

Young children have sensitive skin. Sunscreen should be used on sunny and overcast days. Chapstick and kleenex are handy items to keep in their pockets.

Report any necessary medical information to the Ski School before lessons.

CLASS SCHEDULING CONSIDERATIONS

Give the ski school staff accurate information regarding your child's skiing skill proficiency level to insure proper class placement.

Have the children at class meeting area at the designated time. Children who continually arrive late to class will not be admitted to lessons.

Out of consideration for your child and the instructors, please insure that your child is picked up promptly at the designated hour. Instructors will take those who are not picked up on time to the Day Care room at your expense.

SUGGESTIONS FROM SKI SCHOOL STAFF

Ski with your child in areas recommended by the ski school staff. Because children ski well on gentle terrain does not mean that they can immediately be taken to intermediate terrain. It takes time and repetition to set efficient skiing skills. Give your child quality experiences, not pressure to perform. We would like your children to enjoy the experience of skiing and look forward to learning new skills.


